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Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

But the rest said, "Wait, let us see if Elijah comes to save him." But Jesus cried out again in a loud voice, and gave up his spirit. (Matthew 27:49-51)

Today marks the beginning of Holy Week, the days in the Church year when we celebrate Christ's passion, death and resurrection. Before we get to Easter, though, the Church invites us to ponder the meaning of Jesus' death. And we should start by recognizing that his death was neither an accident nor was it an unfortunate misunderstanding. No, Jesus was murdered by the religious and political leaders of his time who would not tolerate his challenges to their greed, power, and hypocrisy. Jesus' words and actions made them angry, and they initiated actions to bring about his demise.



Jesus' willingness to accept suffering and even death is part of his saving work. His obedience should inspire us to stay faithful to our mission to proclaim the kingdom of God. This means loving others, even when they don't return our love. It means speaking the truth, even when others do not want to hear it. It means asking for forgiveness when we have been wrong. It means caring for others, even when that is difficult or inconvenient. And it means doing all of these things with humility. It isn't easy, but Jesus does not leave us alone in our efforts. Every time we come to the Eucharistic table, he gives himself to us, strengthening us to follow his example.

Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. (Phil 2:6)

Y debemos comenzar por reconocer que su muerte no fue ni un accidente ni un desafortunado malentendido. No, Jesús fue asesinado por los líderes religiosos y políticos de su tiempo que no toleraban sus desafíos a su codicia, poder e hipocresía. Las palabras y acciones de Jesús los enojaron, e iniciaron acciones para provocar su fallecimiento.

La disposición de Jesús a aceptar el sufrimiento e incluso la muerte es parte de su obra salvadora. Su obediencia debe inspirarnos a permanecer fieles a nuestra misión de proclamar el reino de Dios. Esto significa amar a los demás, incluso cuando no devuelven nuestro amor. Significa decir la verdad, incluso cuando otros no quieren escucharla. Significa pedir perdón cuando nos hemos equivocado. Significa cuidar a los demás, incluso cuando eso es difícil o inconveniente. Y significa hacer todas estas cosas con humildad. No es fácil, pero Jesús no nos deja solos en nuestros esfuerzos. Cada vez que venimos a la mesa eucarística, él se entrega a nosotros, fortaleciéndonos para seguir su ejemplo.






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St. Pedro Calungsod

Pedro Calungsod was born in Iloilo, Philippines on July 21, 1654. There is little information about his early life. Different cities claim his birth location, but no one knows which one. All of the towns are in the Diocese of Cebu. His heritage was Filipino and Visayan. The thought was that the term Visayan exclusively belonged to the those from the island of Panay or the neighboring islands of Negros and Romblon but not from Cebu, which was consid-



ered Pintados. This was later disputed saying that regardless of location, anyone in the region could be called Visayan.

Pedro received his primary education at a Jesuit boarding school, studying catechism and learning to speak, read and write in Spanish. His interests included drawing, painting, singing, acting and carpentry skills. He used all of these talents for his missionary work.

In 1668, when he was fourteen, Pedro was chosen to work with Spanish Jesuit missionaries, headed to the "Isles of Thieves", known as Islas de Los Ladrones in Spanish. Later this land would be renamed the Mariana Islands in honor the Blessed Mother and the woman who sponsored and paid for the expenses of the missionaries, Maria Ana of Austria who was the Queen Regent of Spain.

The Marianas are a crescent shaped archipelago, which is a group of islands. Ferdinand Magellan was the first to explore the area in the early sixteenth century. Spanish expeditions continued, with Spain annexing and colonizing the area, establishing their capital in Guam, the largest island. The Chamorro people were the indigenous inhabitants. As a young adult, Pedro became a sacristan and a missionary catechist. He accompanied Diego Luis de San Vitores to the Islands. They brought many to the Catholic faith, baptizing and teaching the people. Life on the islands was difficult

because supplies did not arrive regularly, the jungles and terrain were difficult to navigate and there were frequent typhoons, but they persevered in catechizing the local people.

A Chinese man named Choco was a criminal from Manila who was exiled in Guam. He gained influence over the medicine men of the islands called the Macanjas. He lied, saying that the missionaries were spreading poison by pouring water at baptisms and at Mass. There were some sickly Chamorro infants who were baptized and died, leading many to believe the story and held the missionaries responsible

Both Pedro and Luis were murdered after baptizing an infant and her mother who had converted. The husband of the woman was furious that his daughter was baptized and began throwing spears at Pedro, who dodged them. Witnesses said that Pedro could have escaped the attack but did not want to leave Luis. It was also said that Pedro could have defeated the aggressors with weapons, but Luis would not let his companions carry arms.

Pedro was finally hit in the chest by a spear, falling to the ground, then was killed by a machete blow to the head. Luis blessed Pedro before he was also killed. Pedro was seventeen when he died on April 2, 1672 in Tumon, Guam. Both bodies were thrown into the water.

Pope John Paul II beatified Pedro on March 5, 2000. The recognized miracle date for canonization was on March 26, 2003 regarding a woman from Leyte who had a heart attack and was pronounced clinically dead by the doctors. Two hours after the attack, she was revived by an attending physician who sought Blessed Pedro's intercession.

Pope Benedict canonized Pedro Calungsod on October 21, 2012. He is the second Filipino saint after St. Lorenzo Ruiz of Manila.

St. Pedro Calungsod is often depicted with a palm, spear, bolo, rosary or crucifix and is the patron saint of Filipino youth, Catechumens, Altar servers, Overseas Filipino Workers, Cebuanos, Visayans, Pury, San Antonio, Quezon Province and the secondary patron saint of the Archdiocese of Cebu. His feast day is April 2.

Pope John Paul II beatified Diego Luis de San Vitores in Rome in 1985.
