

Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of bread. (Lk 24:34-35)

On this third Sunday of Easter, we continue to celebrate in a more profound way the power and meaning of the Resurrection. Luke and Peter, whose words we hear today, were witnesses to the Resurrection and had interactions with the risen Christ. They were among the first to grapple with what it all meant and to share its Good News. We are recipients of that Good News and come together in worship, to be glad and rejoice in it.



It was difficult for the disciples to understand all the events surrounding Jesus. Cleopas and his companion were debating all that had happened as they walked to Emmaus. It was not until a traveling companion interpreted Scripture for them and broke bread with them that they saw Jesus and comprehended how he had fulfilled the Scriptures.

Fulfillment in Christ was known by God before the foundation of the world, Peter tells us. Salvation through Christ's sacrificial love poured forth was always the plan. The world was founded on it, the disciples witnessed it, and we are all redeemed by it. This is what we continue to celebrate this Easter season: God's love and mercy from the foundation of the world through Christ, broken and shared for us. Let us be glad and rejoice!

He was known before the foundation of the world but revealed in the final time for you, who through him believe in God who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.(IPet.1:21)

Fueron de los primeros en lidiar con lo que todo esto significaba y en compartir sus Buenas Nuevas. Somos receptores de esas Buenas Nuevas y nos reunimos en adoración, para alegrarnos y regocijarnos en ella.

Era difícil para los discípulos entender todos los eventos que rodeaban a Jesús. Cleofas y su compañero estaban debatiendo todo lo que había sucedido mientras caminaban hacia Emaús. No fue hasta que un compañero de viaje interpretó las Escrituras para ellos y partió el pan con ellos que vieron a Jesús y comprendieron cómo había cumplido las Escrituras.

El cumplimiento en Cristo era conocido por Dios antes de la fundación del mundo, nos dice Pedro. La salvación a través del amor sacrificial de Cristo derramado fue siempre el plan. El mundo fue fundado sobre él, los discípulos lo presenciaron, y todos somos redimidos por él. Esto es lo que seguimos celebrando en este tiempo de Pascua: el amor y la misericordia de Dios desde la fundación del mundo a través de Cristo, roto y compartido por nosotros. ¡Alegrémonos y regocijémonos!

Él era conocido antes de la fundación del mundo, pero revelado en el tiempo final para ti, que a través de él crees en Dios que lo resucitó de entre los muertos y le dio gloria, para que tu fe y esperanza estén en Dios. (1 Pedro 1:21)

Weekly Reflection

Christ Remains Present

God has raised this Jesus to life, and we are all witnesses of it. Exalted to the right hand of **God**, he has received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit and has poured out what you now see and hear. Acts 2:32-33



A powerful thread of truth runs through each of today's Easter season readings: Jesus resurrected. "God raised this Jesus; of this we are all witnesses" (Acts 2:32). The Apostles testified to this raising of Jesus, but also, and maybe even more powerful is the testimony of those who did not want this truth to be known. Scholars often refer to the latter as "hostile witnesses." People, who could not deny what they saw but did not wish to perpetuate the following of Christ, become witnesses to the majesty of God. Fascinating how differently the world perceives the history of secular nature from that of religion. We possess many history books filled with events, teachings, and speeches; we do not doubt nor question; we trust what was seen and recorded has been done so accurately. And it is taught from generation to generation.

Yet, how few believe "God raised this Jesus." The Resurrection opened heaven to those "who through him believe in God who raised him from the dead and gave him glory so that your faith and hope are in God." St. Peter reminds us to hold fast to this truth so that our hope and faith remain with God. The testimony of those who saw, spoke, and ate with the Risen Lord, provides us a confident hope in the Good News. No one, but One, has ever claimed to be the Son of God and then rose from the dead. Two Thousand years later, we are still speaking of his salvific work upon the cross, still representing those moments upon altars across the world, still worshiping and singing praises.

The 24th Chapter of Luke's Gospel includes the Walk to Emmaus. Jesus journeyed alongside these disciples, but they did not recognize him. He is still with us today, a true and ever-present companion. How often do we fail to recognize Jesus

in our midst? In the Emmaus encounter, in the breaking of bread, "their eves were opened and they recognized him" (Luke 24:31). Jesus offers the faithful that same wondrous opportunity at each and every Mass to be present at the blessing and breaking of the bread. To experience the burning of our hearts as the Scriptures are opened, and Jesus is made truly present - Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity, in the Eucharist.



When the disciples encountered Jesus on the road, they urged him to stay with them. Through God's mystical, remarkable workings, which we will never comprehend this side of heaven, Jesus remains with us still at every Consecration, in every Tabernacle, and within the heart of those who receive him in the Eucharist.



St. Louis Marie de Montfort

Louis Grignion de Montfort was born on January 31, 1673 in Montfort-sur-Meu in Brittany. He was the eldest surviving child of eighteen born to Jean-Baptiste and Jeanne Robert Grignion. His father was a notary, but soon bought a farm in Iffendic, where Louis grew up. He took the name Marie at his Confirmation.

When he was twelve years old, Louis entered the Jesuit College of St. Thomas Becket in Rennes, where his uncle was a



parish priest. There he studied philosophy and theology. He was inspired by a local priest, Abbe Julian Bellier, who often spoke of his life as a missionary. He also taught his students to give themselves to the Blessed Mother through consecration and trust, leading Louis to develop his strong devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, especially through the rosary. Louis also had a deep devotion to angels. As a seminarian in Paris, he was known for the veneration he had toward the angels. He "urged his confreres to show marks of respect and tenderness to their guardian angels." Louis often ended his letters with a salutation to the guardian angel of the person he was writing to saying "I salute your guardian angel."

One of the reasons why he had such angelic devotion is that veneration of the angels was an integral part of his training and culture. The Jesuits were known for their zeal in propagating devotion to the angels and taught this to their students. Louis' seminary training was from Cardinals de Bérulle and Olier, both of whom taught this. While at school, Louis developed a love for the poor and joined a society of young men who ministered to the sick and the needy when they were on school holidays. At the age of nineteen, he walked one hundred thirty miles to Paris so he could study theology. Along the way, he gave all he had to the poor whom he met and made a vow to live only on alms.

Louis was ordained a priest in June of 1700 when he was twenty seven and was assigned to Nantes. Then he served as a hospital chaplain in Poitiers until the management there resented his reorganization of the staff and dismissed him. In November of 1700 he joined the Third Order of the Dominicans and asked permission to teach the rosary and form rosary confraternities. He started thinking about the formation of a small company of priests to preach missions and retreats under the protection of the Blessed Virgin. This eventually led to the formation of the Company of Mary. There he met Marie Louise Trichet, who devoted thirty four years of service to the poor. She was later beatified.

Louis wanted to be a missionary, so he went to Rome to see Pope Clement XI, who told him to go back to France and work with his people.

The Pope gave Louis the title of "Apostolic Missionary." Louis began speaking at the missions in Brittany, Pontchateau, Vendée and Nantes. At the age of thirty two, he realized that he had a gift for preaching and committed to this for the rest of his life. His sermons drew thousands as he spoke of devotion to Mary and to receive Holy Communion. Yet he received opposition from a heretical group called the Jansenists who believed in absolute predestination, saying that only a few chosen would be saved, with the rest being sent to hell. This philosophy influenced much of France at this time, including some bishops who banned him from preaching in their dioceses. One of the Jansenists in La Rochelle poisoned Louis, who survived, but had bad health afterwards. While he was recuperating from the poisoning, Louis wrote his masterpiece of Marian piety called "True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin." He correctly prophesied that this work would be hidden by the devil for a time, which it was. The document was discovered two hundred years after his death. He also wrote "The Secret of Mary" and "The Secret of the Rosary."

Besides these, he wrote rules for the Company of Mary and the Daughters of Wisdom, as well as many hymns. Louis founded the two congregations one year before he died - the Daughters of Divine Wisdom, which tended to the sick in hospitals and the education of poor girls and the Company of Mary, who were missionaries devoted to preaching and to spreading devotion to Mary. He established free schools for poor children too.

Louis died on April 28, 1716. Thousands attended his funeral and many stories of miracles at his grave were told. Pope Leo XIII beatified Louis in 1888 and Pope Pius XII canonized him on July 20, 1947. His feast day is April 28. According to St. Louis, "Mary is the safest, easiest, shortest, and most perfect way of approaching Jesus." He influenced many popes with his concepts.

In the nineteenth century, Pope Pius IX considered Louis' works as the best and most acceptable form of Marian devotion, while Pope Leo XIII granted indulgences for practicing Louis' method of Marian consecration. When Pope Leo XIII beatified Louis in 1888, he chose this beatification day as the day of his own Golden Jubilee as a priest and granted indulgences for practicing Blessed Louis' method of Marian dedication.

In the twentieth century Pope Pius X accredited the influence of Blessed Louis' writings in the composition of his encyclical *Ad diem illum*. Pope Pius XI stated that he had practiced Blessed Louis' devotional methods since he was a young man.

When Pope Pius XII canonized St. Louis, the Pope said that St. Louis de Montfort is the guide "who leads you to Mary and from Mary to Jesus."

Pope John Paul II once remembered how as a young seminarian he "read and reread many times and with great spiritual profit" a work of St. Louis de Montfort and said that: "Then I understood that I could not exclude the Lord's Mother from my life without neglecting the will of God-Trinity." According to his Apostolic Letter *Rosarium Virginis Mariae*, Pope John Paul's personal motto was "Totus Tuus", which means "totally yours." The thoughts, writings and example of St. Louis de Montfort were also mentioned by Pope John Paul II's encyclical *Redemptoris Mater* as a distinct witness of Marian spirituality in the Roman Catholic tradition.





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
