



Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." (Jn. 20:21)

The Gospel reminds us that on Easter night, Jesus' Apostles had been filled with fear. The room was locked for fear of the Jewish leaders who had conspired with the Romans to kill Jesus, and who the Apostles feared were after them next. Jesus enters into that locked room. He enters into that fear and then he offers them his peace, which is tied to his gift of the Holy Spirit.

Yet this doesn't make them immune from their fears returning, even after the Holy Spirit comes upon them at Pentecost. It does give them the ability to face and live with their fears, and to overcome them when necessary. We heard in the first reading that the Apostles were



But after that event, spreading the Gospel would become a choice they would have to make daily. Jesus, who remains with us in his word, in his body and blood in the Eucharist, in the Church - continues to pour out his gift of the Holy Spirit upon us. He has promised that he will never leave us. He has promised that he will continue to do tremendous deeds through each and every one of us who make up the Church. But it's still a matter of choice, a decision on our part. We must want the Holy Spirit. We must want his peace.

As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit. (1Cor. 12:12-13)

Los discípulos se regocijaron cuando vieron al Señor. Jesús les dijo de nuevo: "La paz esté con ustedes. Como el Padre me envió, así yo os envío a vosotros". (Juan 20:21)

El Evangelio nos recuerda que en la noche de Pascua, los apóstoles de Jesús habían sido llenos de miedo. La habitación estaba cerrada con llave por temor a los líderes judíos que habían conspirado con los romanos para matar a Jesús, y que los apóstoles temían que fueran tras ellos a continuación. Jesús entra en esa habitación cerrada. Entra en ese miedo y luego les ofrece su paz, que está ligada a su don del Espíritu Santo.

Sin embargo, esto no los hace inmunes a que sus temores regresen, incluso después de que el Espíritu Santo venga sobre ellos en Pentecostés. Les da la capacidad de enfrentar y vivir con sus miedos, y superarlos cuando sea necesario. En la primera lectura escuchamos que los Apóstoles fueron transformados por este don. E inmediatamente después, se desata un nuevo coraje. Hablan en nuevos idiomas y la Iglesia comienza a crecer.

Pero después de ese evento, difundir el Evangelio se convertiría en una elección que tendrían que hacer diariamente. Jesús, que permanece con nosotros en su palabra, en su cuerpo y sangre en la Eucaristía, en la Iglesia, continúa derramando sobre nosotros su don del Espíritu Santo. Él ha prometido que nunca nos dejará. Él ha prometido que continuará haciendo obras tremendas a través de todos y cada uno de nosotros que formamos la Iglesia. Pero sigue siendo una cuestión de elección, una decisión de nuestra parte. Debemos querer al Espíritu Santo. Debemos querer su paz.

Como un cuerpo es uno, aunque tiene muchas partes, y todas las partes del cuerpo, aunque muchas, son un solo cuerpo, así también Cristo. Porque en un solo Espíritu todos fuimos bautizados en un solo cuerpo, ya sean judíos o griegos, esclavos o personas libres, y todos fuimos dados a beber de un solo Espíritu. (1 Corintios 12:12-13)

Weekly Reflection

Pentecost and Captain America

In the movie, *Captain America*, Steve is a young man of strong character who wants to work for justice in the world, in spite of his evident lack of bulk and brawn. Steve has everything going for him except the physical strength to carry out his laudable ambitions.

His situation reminds me of the apostles before Pentecost, before the promised Holy Spirit descended upon them in the upper room as He did in today's First Reading. The apostles loved Jesus. Their intentions were golden. These earnest men had learned a great deal by being with Our Lord, and it was their desire to continue His life-saving mission. But they were too feeble.

In the case of the earliest Church leaders, it wasn't physical strength they needed, it was the courage, the love, and the power to do all that Jesus had commissioned them to do. Now, in the upper room, Christ keeps his last promise to his beloved friends and sends them the Holy Spirit. Similar to the way Steve was changed in mere moments through a scientific experiment into the buff and beautiful Captain America, the apostles were filled with the Holy Spirit and utterly transfigured. This historic moment wasn't just a radical turning point in the lives the apostles, it was the birth of the Church. Furthermore, ever since that moment, every human being



has had the opportunity to share in God's Divine life through the Spirit. The power Pentecost unleashed on the world was tsunamic in the best way possible.

Again and again, the Catechism of the Catholic Church refers to the action of the Holy Spirit: He animates all creation, awakens faith, enables communication with Christ, helps man grow in spiritual freedom, is the master and source of prayer, is the principal author of Scripture and so on. The Catechism also highlights the gifts of the Holy Spirit (1831), His fruits (1832), and His charisms (2003).

It is breathtaking to think that, at the moment of our baptisms, the third Person of the Trinity comes to dwell in us and bestows supernatural gifts upon us. If we cooperate with the movement of the Spirit in our lives and in our souls, we will receive whatever we need to grow in holiness and minister to those around us. He wants to empower us. The apostles, who desired the Holy Spirit, awaited Him eagerly, and responded whole-heartedly to His inspirations, are models for us to imitate.

The kind of decision that the character of Steve in *Captain America* had to make was one that faces all of us in the spiritual realm. Are we content to be spiritually puny, reticent to tap into Divine power? Or are we ready to take our good intentions and our knowledge of Christ to the next level, out of love of God and neighbor, by allowing the Holy Spirit to even more radically transform us? The world awaits our answer.

Two Holy Military Priests

On this Memorial Day, we remember all of the men and women who sacrificed their lives so that we could have freedom. Many of them were in our own families.

Two men that we need to honor today are priests, Father Emil Kapaun and Father Vincent Capodanno. Both of them served our country, are Medal of Honor recipients, died in service and are currently undergoing the process for canonization. This would make these two men the first saints who served in the United States military.

Emil Joseph Kapaun was born on April 20, 1916 in Pilsen, Kansas. His parents were Enos and Elizabeth (Hajek) Kapaun, who were

Czech immigrants. Emil graduated from Pilsen High School in 1930, Conception Abbey Seminary College in 1936 and Kenrick Theological Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri in 1940. He was ordained a priest on June 9, 1940 in the Diocese of Wichita. He became the auxiliary chaplain at Herington Army Airfield in Kansas. In 1944 Emil Kapaun was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the US Army as a chaplain in the Burma Theater towards the end of World War II. After leaving the Army at the conclusion of the war, he went on to pursue graduate studies, then returned to active duty afterwards. Father Emil was stationed in Japan with the Eighth Cavalry Regiment near Mount Fuji. On July 15, 1950, the Cavalry Division and Father left Tokyo Bay sailing for Korea, less than a month after North Korea had invaded South Ko-

rea. He was respected among his peers, often being sought out as a source of advice and friendship by the soldiers he ministered to. Father Emil was sent to a combat zone during the beginning of the Korean War. He used the hood of a jeep as his altar, saying prayers and Masses, sometimes even while under enemy fire. Father was taken prisoner, along with a number of others from his unit during the Battle of Unsan. They were force-marched to a Chinese prison camp. There he and his fellow prisoners of war

would receive harsh treatment at the hands of their abductors. Father would steal food and medicine from Chinese storage sites at the camp to feed the malnourished and help the sick POWs. He also used to tackle or shove the Chinese soldiers who were lined up to kill American military. He became ill, but still ministered to the troops and died in captivity from malnutrition and pneumonia. Initially Father was buried there, but eventually his remains were brought back to the US. On September 29, 2021, a Mass of Christian Burial was held in Kansas at the Hartman Arena in Park City, near Wichita. Then a horse-drawn caisson carried his remains to the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Wichita. Father was given military honors and interred

inside the church. President Obama presented the Medal of Honor awarded to Father Emil's nephew at the White House on April 11, 2013. He also was given many other awards, including the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star.

Lieutenant Vincent Robert Capodanno was another military chaplain who lost his life in a war. He was born on February 13, 1929 in Staten Island, NY, the tenth child of Italian immigrants, Vincent Robert Capodanno, Sr. and Rachel Basile Capodanno. He attended Curtis High School and Fordham University. In 1949 Vincent applied to the Maryknoll's and was accepted. After nine years of schooling and completing seminary training, he was ordained in 1958 by Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York. After ordination, Vincent served in Taiwan and Hong Kong.

Lieutenant Capodanno was commissioned an officer in the Navy. He felt that he was called to be deployed to South Vietnam, instead of staying state side. Per his request, Father was sent to the war zone in 1966 to minister to the Seventh Marine Regiment fighting against the Communist North Vietnamese forces. The marines called him the "The Grunt Padre" because he always went into combat to give aid to corpsmen who sustained injuries in battle. Father extended his tour in Vietnam for another year to be with the Fifth Marine Regiment. In 1967, some Marines were overrun by North Vietnam troops. Father ran into the battle to pull them out of danger. He gave Last Rites to the dying while tending to the wounded with medical aid. A burst of machine gun fire killed him as he attempted to shield a Marine from enemy fire with his own body. He received the Medal of Honor posthumously in 1969 as well as the Navy Bronze Star medal, the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star and the Purple Heart Medal. There are chapels dedicated to him in Vietnam, Newport RI, Oakland, CA, Camp Pendleton, CA, Fort Wadsworth, NY, Iwakuni, Japan and Thiankou, Taiwan. A ship was named the USS Capodanno, whose motto was "Duty with Honor" exemplifying the chaplain service of Father Capodanno. This was the first ship in the US Fleet to receive a Papal Blessing while docked in Naples, Italy. There are also military buildings named after him in Gaeta, Italy, San Francisco and Millington, TN. From his hometown, there is Capodanno Boulevard in Staten Island and also one at the Naval Base in Newport, RI.

All these years later, both priests have generated huge followings, especially among Marines, soldiers and sailors, who pray to the Fathers for their spiritual intercession. A number of miraculous events have since occurred attributed to the assistance which these two chaplains have provided from beyond the grave. Currently, the miracles ascribed to the intercessions of Father Kapaun and Father Capodanno are under procedural investigation by the Church. Once they are approved, these two former servicemen will be venerated, beatified and then canonized as the first American military saints in history.
