

Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

Jesus said to the Jewish crowds: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world. "(Jn. 6:51)

This is what the church celebrates today in its Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ: "Corpus Christi." It is a celebration of God's saving grace given to us in his word, promise and hope for eternal life - all in the person of Jesus Christ. Jesus, who gives us his body and blood in the Eucharist, is the perfect satisfaction of all desires and all hunger. He is the satisfaction of hunger for one's life to have meaning, to have forgiveness, and to have acceptance.



These hungers can only be satisfied by spiritual "food" - the food that is ultimately an encounter with God through Christ Jesus. Or as Jesus says in the Gospel, *Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.* What a blessing that the Church provides us with many opportunities to be fed by Jesus. We are fed through the love we share with one another, through our shared acts of service and justice, through our shared prayer, and especially in our sharing of the Eucharist. Let us give thanks for these gifts!

Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf. (1Cor. 10:17)


Weekly Reflection

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

You Are What You Eat

In John's Gospel, Jesus gives a long discourse on the Bread of Life. The first part talks of bread as a sign of God's loving care for the people. Like the manna in the desert, Jesus represents God caring for the people in a new way.



But the part we hear in today's Gospel is more specific. He says the bread he will give is his flesh. The leaders of the Jews don't understand. Hopefully, we can do better.

In the pagan world at the time of Christ and before, a sacrifice was also a meal. An animal was ritually killed and burnt (i.e., cooked) to be shared at a meal with the people. The sacrifice was a gift to the god(s) that joined the people to their deity and also to each other. So Jesus used that understanding of sacrifice to explain his gift of self. He would die on the cross as a sacrifice to the Father and we would share in the meal by consuming bread and wine, which are his Body and Blood. That meal is shared today in the Eucharist.

Better than the pagan sacrifice, the Eucharist unites us with God because Jesus is both human and divine. His humanity allowed him to represent us to the Father, as a lawyer represents a client to the court. Jesus' divinity allowed his sacrifice to be worthy of the Father, as no merely human gift could be. So giving his life on the cross was the best and only way that he could offer a true sacrifice to the Father.

The Eucharist also unites us to one another. We share this meal with other Christians as a sign of our common faith. Christ who gave himself to the Father on the cross also gives himself to us in the

Eucharist. And because the food we share is the Body and Blood of Christ, we in a sense become what we eat. So we are all members of the Body of Christ. We show this by our love, by sharing our faith, by forgiving each other, and by our service to each other. If we believe that Jesus is divine, we must believe his word that the Eucharist is truly his Body and Blood, given for us.

The next meeting is Wednesday, June 14th.



St. Barnabas

Barnabas, whose birth name was Joses, was born in the First Century to a wealthy family on the island of Cyprus. He was known for selling his land and giving the money to the Apostles in Jerusalem. Then they gave him the name of Barnabas.



He was a cousin of St. Mark the Evangelist, a Cypriot Jew who accompanied Paul on missionary journeys, converting people. They also attended the Council of Jerusalem in 49 AD. They preached in Pamphylia, Pisidia and Lycaonia. When Paul and Barnabas were expelled from Pisidia, they were "filled with joy and the Holy Spirit." His name is mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles and in some Epistles. Barnabas introduced Paul to Peter and the other Apostles and served as a mediator between Paul and the still suspicious Jewish Christians.

In Lystra the people there thought of Barnabas as Zeus and Paul as Hermes and wanted to offer sacrifices to them as gods, but Paul and Barnabas said, "Men, why are you doing this? We are of the same nature as you, human beings. We proclaim to you good news that you should turn from these idols to the living

God, who made heaven and earth and sea and all that is in them." (Acts 14:15).

Paul and Barnabas, were now seen as charismatic leaders and were sent by Antioch officials to preach to the Gentiles. Antioch was the third-most important city of the Roman Empire at that time, the capital city of the Syria province. Today we know it as Antakya, Turkey. Many early Christians were affected by the martyrdom of St. Stephen in Jerusalem, so they went to Antioch to live. They were mostly those of the merchant class who supported the church.

After Paul and Barnabas returned from Antioch, they went to Jerusalem to discuss the relationship of the Gentiles to Christianity, admitting them to the church without the Gentiles having to adopt Jewish practices, such as circumcision. While back in Antioch, Peter came and met with the Gentiles, eating with them but his behavior was criticized as "being against Mosaic law by" some disciples of James.

Peter yielded to them and Barnabas did also, but Paul said that this was wrong, calling it hypocritical, stating that they "And the rest of the Jews [also] acted hypocritically along with him, with the result that even Barnabas was carried away by their hypocrisy. But when I saw that they were not on the right road in line with the truth of the gospel, I said to Cephas in front of all, "If you, though a Jew, are living like a Gentile and not like a Jew, how can you compel the Gentiles to live like Jews?" (Galatians 2:13-14).

Paul then asked Barnabas to go on another trip. Barnabas wanted to take his cousin John Mark along, but Paul did not. This led them to separate. Paul took Silas as his companion and went to Syria and Cilicia and Barnabas and John Mark went to Cyprus.

Little is known of Barnabas after this. He was still living and working as an missionary in 56 or 57 AD. Paul wrote 1 Corinthians (9:5-6) at that time mentioning Barnabas, implying that their friendship was unimpaired. Later Paul, Barnabas and Mark reconciled. When Paul was a prisoner in Rome from 61 to 63 AD, John Mark was attached to him as a disciple, which suggested that Barnabas was no longer living (Colossians 4:10).

Barnabas was martyred at Salamis, Cyprus. He was bound with a rope at his neck and then dragged to the site where he was burned to death in 60 AD.

There is a major shrine at the Monastery of St. Barnabas in Famagusta, Cyprus. He is often depicted wearing red, carrying a Pilgrim's staff and holding an olive branch and the Gospel of St. Matthew.

St. Barnabas is the patron saint of Cyprus, against hailstorms and is invoked as a peacemaker.

His feast day is June 11.
