

Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

Jesus said to the Twelve: "Fear no one. Nothing is concealed that will not be revealed, nor secret that will not be known. What I say to you in the darkness, speak in the light; what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops.(Mt. 10:26-27)

We let our faith, not fear, guide our choices to bring us closer to heaven. In the first reading, the prophet Jeremiah experienced terrible hardships, including arrest, disgrace, and exile. He had reason to lose hope, but he kept his faith in God. *The Lord is with me, like a mighty champion,* he says. *Sing to the Lord, praise the Lord, for he has rescued the life of the poor from the power of the wicked!*



Consider this prayer in the light of Jesus' words to the Twelve: *Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna.* Jeremiah would have understood exactly what Jesus meant. Though he

experienced fear and inner turmoil, he did not let those overpower his faith and trust in God. He knew that the Lord was with him and would always win in the end. The Lord, he knew, would save the faithful.

This lesson, however, is not just for the prophets and martyrs. Every moment of our lives is an opportunity to acknowledge, or deny, Christ before others. Each choice we make will be made known at the end of time. Our heavenly Father already knows our every thought and deed. Lord, help us to realize that our Father who loves us will grant us the graces we need. Holy Spirit, help guide us. Give us the long view of eternity, knowing that our choices today will affect our souls for eternity. Lord, lead us to everlasting life with you. Amen!

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Jesús dijo a los Doce: "No temáis a nadie. No se oculta nada que no se revele, ni se conozca el secreto. Lo que os digo en las tinieblas, hablad en la luz; Lo que escuchas susurrado, proclama en los techos de las casas. (Mt 10:26-27)

Dejamos que nuestra fe, no el miedo, guíe nuestras decisiones para acercarnos al cielo. En la primera lectura, el profeta Jeremías experimentó terribles dificultades, incluyendo arresto, desgracia y exilio. Tenía razones para perder la esperanza, pero mantuvo su fe en Dios. *El Señor está conmigo, como un poderoso campeón,* dice. *¡Canta al Señor, alabado sea el Señor, porque él ha rescatado la vida de los pobres del poder de los malvados!*

Considere esta oración a la luz de las palabras de Jesús a los Doce: *No tengan miedo de aquellos que matan el cuerpo pero no pueden matar el alma; más bien, tengan miedo de aquel que puede destruir tanto el alma como el cuerpo en Gehena.* Jeremías habría entendido exactamente lo que Jesús quiso decir. Aunque experimentó miedo y agitación interior, no permitió que esos dominaran su fe y confianza en Dios. Sabía que el Señor estaba con él y que siempre ganaría al final. El Señor, él sabía, salvaría a los fieles.

Esta lección, sin embargo, no es sólo para los profetas y mártires. Cada momento de nuestras vidas es una oportunidad para reconocer o negar a Cristo ante los demás. Cada elección que hagamos se dará a conocer al final de los tiempos. Nuestro Padre celestial ya conoce cada uno de nuestros pensamientos y obras. Señor, ayúdanos a darnos cuenta de que nuestro Padre que nos ama nos concederá las gracias que necesitamos. Espíritu Santo, ayúdanos a guiarnos. Danos la visión a largo plazo de la eternidad, sabiendo que nuestras elecciones de hoy afectarán nuestras almas por la eternidad. Señor, guíanos a la vida eterna contigo. ¡Amén!



Weekly Reflection

The Paradox of Faith

"Fear no one," Jesus says. He is talking about fearing those who persecute you for your faith. In the verses be-

fore this Gospel passage, he tries to prepare us for that persecution and says that since it was done to him (Jesus), it would be done to his followers.

But what happened to Jesus? He was crucified, but rose from the dead. So he triumphed over his persecutors; they could not stop him. And that is what he promises us. Whatever persecution, ridicule, or discrimination we suffer for our faith, we cannot be destroyed as long as we keep that faith.

Now the best way to keep that faith is to give it away. That sounds like a paradox,

but it means that when we spread the faith, our faith grows, too. Sure, it takes courage to talk about our faith to another, but when we share our stories about what God means to us, we relive those experiences; we remind ourselves what God has done for us. And when we allow others to share their faith with us, we are encouraged and supported. That is why Jesus says that what is hidden will be made known: True faith never stays hidden; it needs to be shared.

Sometimes we may hesitate to talk about our faith. If we let ourselves be tempted to silence, we are letting the devil have his way. That is the only thing to fear: not Satan's power, but our weakness. That's why Jesus said whoever denies him will be denied by him. Yet Jesus died for our sins, so even they cannot destroy us if we turn back to the Lord. Just as God knows every sparrow that falls, so he knows us when we fall and values us more than sparrows.

So thank him for his forgiveness, but don't forget to spread the news that you are forgiven. You might give someone else the courage to come back to the Lord, and so score another victory for faith over fear.


JOIN US FOR HOSPITALITY WEEKEND






First Martyrs of the Holy Roman Church

In 64 AD Nero was the Emperor of Rome. Early Christians were living there as well as many Jewish people. It was a city of wealth and poverty. Wooden tenements were the homes of the poor.



Fires soon occurred, beginning on July 18, with the blame placed on Nero. He had the city reconstructed in the Greek style and began building a huge palace, called the Golden House. It was never completed but if it had been, it would have covered a third of Rome. Nero was at his villa at Antium thirty five miles from Rome and was not responsible for the burning of the city, but the Roman people believed that he started the fires, which lasted six days and seven nights, destroying almost three-quarters of Rome, including fourteen districts and severely damaging seven other areas. Nero in turn blamed the Christians and ordered them to die that August. He was one of the most evil of Rome's Twelve Caesars. The Christians were called "Chrestians."

Why did Nero blame the Christians? Partly because they were living near the place where the fires started in the eastern part of the Circus Maximus, which was the Roman chariot racing stadium and the area for mass entertainment.

The first Roman Christians were Jews who lived with the other Jews. One of the Jewish quarters in Rome was just east of the Circus, near the Capena Gate. It was considered a slum area - "Now, the grove with its sacred spring and the shrine [of a water goddess] are rented to Jews, whose worldly goods are no more than a basket and some hay. The woods has become the haunt of beggars."

According to the historian Tacitus, who wrote in *The Annals*, many Christians were put to death "not so much of the crime of firing the city, as of hatred against mankind." These were Christian men, women and children from all areas of life. They were killed by wild animals, nailed to crosses or burned alive, serving as torches for nightly illuminations. Nero used his gardens for the spectacle, while he mingled with the people or stood further away watching. The total number killed is unknown, but estimates are in the thousands. The events were recorded by both Pope Clement I and Tacitus.

Peter and Paul were also the victims of Roman wrath, with St. Paul being decapitated and St. Peter was crucified. According to tradition, Paul was a Roman citizen so he had the right be beheaded by a sword, but Peter suffered the fate of Christ, crucifixion, but with his head downward.

These holy men and women are also called the "Protomartyrs of Rome." In 1969, the General Roman Calendar was reformed and this feast day was added to it. The placement of this holy day is the day after the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, who are the principal patron saints of Rome.

Tertullian was an early Christian writer from Carthage who said "The blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church" (*Apologeticus*, Chapter 50).

The church of Santi Protomartiri a Via Aurelia Antica in Rome is dedicated to these first martyrs. It was built on the site of Nero's Circus and the location of St. Peter's martyrdom and is marked by the Piazza dei Protomartiri Romani (Square of the Roman Protomartyrs) in the Vatican next to St. Peter's Basilica.

The martyrs were called the "Disciples of the Apostles." They faced gruesome deaths which were a powerful testimony that led to many conversions in the early Roman Church.

Their feast day is on June 30

This is their prayer:

Anonymous first martyrs of Rome, your blood is still wet, and your sufferings still felt, in the same Church of Christ to which you belonged through baptism. Through your intercession, help the baptized of today be as courageous as you in all things.

Threatened by an army revolt and condemned to death by the senate, Nero committed suicide in 68 AD at the age of 31.
