A message from Father Carlos - Un mensaje de Padre Carlos

Dear Parish Community of St. Faustina,

On this Second Sunday of Advent, the prophetic voice of St. John tells us that the Lord is near and asks us to prepare His way through personal conversion. In the First Reading from the Prophet Isaiah, the prophet tells us: Prepare the Way of the Lord! When God's people have suffered in exile, God comforts them through the prophet: God remains faithful to the covenant. God is once again ready to lead His people once again to freedom. In the Second Reading from the Second Letter of Peter, he encourages with the Hope of New Heavens and New Earth. We who listen today must not forget that we must actively prepare for the day of the Lord's coming and work with Him to create a new and just world. The Gospel of Mark insists: Prepare the Way for the Coming of Christ! John the Baptist prepared for the coming of Christ by his preaching and his example of life.

We live in difficult times, there are struggles and wars, injustices remain or even increase, as now the means to commit them are more powerful. There is little love and compassion among people. We know that Christ came a long time ago, so the question that should challenge us today is: What have we done about the Good News of Jesus about love, justice and peace? What efforts have we made to build paths that lead to God and to our brothers and sisters? Can we say, "Here is our God," in whose name we make this earth new?



It is assumed that, as Christians, we are a pilgrim people, a people constantly on the march towards God and towards our brothers and sisters. Today the voice of the prophet tries to awaken us. He calls us to prepare the way of the Lord, to make His paths plain and straight, so that they may be paths that lead to God: paths of conversion, righteousness, and freedom. Let us make our own this invitation that He, Jesus Himself, makes to us. Let us fearlessly and with great faith ask Jesus to help us carry out this mission.



Blessed János Anasztáz Brenner

János Anasztáz Brenner was born on December 17,1931 in Szombathely, in the Vas Provence of Hungary. His father was József Brenner and his mother was Ilona Wranovich. He was the second of three sons, his brothers also became priests and his nickname was Jancsi.

As a young boy, János was a boy scout, loved sports and was involved with the activities of the Congregation of Mary. He attended a Cistercian-run grammar school from 1941 to 1946 when the family moved to Pécs. Then he went to the grammar school that the Premonstratensian Canons managed and finally completed his education at the Cistercian school in Zirc. The Catholic schools were taken over by the communists in 1948, causing János to finish his high school studies in Zirc as an oblate of the Cistercian community. It was here that János began his novitiate with the Cistercians on August 19, 1950. He took the religious name "Anasztáz", meaning Anastasius.

While he was studying for the novitiate, János kept a journal, writing about his early adolescence and his involvement with worldly activities such as parties and dances, eventually realizing that he was seeking something better. Now his studies included the Introduction to the Theology of Spiritual Life, Rule of St. Benedict, Psalms, Liturgy, History of the Order and a philosophy course.



It was the time when the communists began suppressing religion in Hungary, causing János to interrupt his studies. On September 7, the government published a decree prohibiting all religious orders and set a deadline for the total abandonment of the Monastery by October 15. The Abbot was arrested on October 28. Lawrence was now the acting leader of the novices who tried to protect the young men undergoing studies by moving them from the abbey and placing them with families in apartments. They met clandestinely for formation and fellowship. Brother Anasztáz was also able to attend a diocesan seminary while staying in touch with Lawrence and studied in Budapest and in Győr.

On June 19, 1955, Brother Anasztáz was ordained in the diocesan cathedral of Szombathely by Bishop Sándor Kovács. He was appointed as the parochial vicar to Rábakethely, a small town near the Austrian border, along with three neighboring villages. Father János was now at St. Gotthard, a parish which had been run by the Cistercians for centuries. The people there loved him, always listening to him speak. He attracted the young, old, gypsies, beggars. He loved to chat with everyone and always wanted to serve. His kindness and personality brought many back to the faith.

After the communists made personal threats against the idealistic young chaplain, his bishop offered to send Father János somewhere else, but he said, "I'm not afraid" and affirmed his stance to remain where he was. The communist authorities still suspected him of being critical of their regime. Father was popular, which also made him a threat. One night, as he was riding home, someone threw logs on the road in front of his motorcycle, but Father managed to drive on. He later said that "They had no luck."

Father János said his last Mass on December 14, 1957. Near midnight on December 15, while Father was preparing his sermon for the next Sunday Mass, he was called to give last rites to a sick man in Zsida, a neighboring town. He didn't know that he was being set up. The seventeen year old boy who called him had been an altar server. Father took the anointing oils and Eucharist with him in his bag. As he was walking through the woods, he was overcome and stabbed thirty two times. That morning his body was found with the Eucharist still in held in his hands. He was then called the "Hungarian Tarcisius" since he died in similar circumstances as Tarcisius, who was a third century martyr. Tarcisius was stoned and beaten by a crowd while carrying the Eucharist. The young man who lured Father from the rectory with the fake sick call spent six years in prison.

Father János was buried in the family vault in the Salesian church of St. Quirinus on December 18. Large crowds appeared at this funeral. The communist authorities tried to disperse the people, but were unsuccessful. His ordination motto was inscribed on the tomb: "All things work together for good to those who love God." This was taken from Romans 8:28.

In 1981, a stained glass window was dedicated to him in St. Elizabeth's Church in his hometown and in 1989, the Chapel of the Good Pastor was built on the exact spot where Father had been murdered.

The diocesan investigations regarding canonization began on October 3, 1999. Pope John Paul II started the beatification process on February 14, 2001, with the Vatican later validating the process on September 18, 2009 and a commission of historians approved the cause on September 4, 2015. Pope Francis confirmed that Father Brenner died as a victim "in odium fidei" (in hatred of the faith) on November 8, 2017 and beatified Father János Brenner that day. A solemn liturgy then took place on May 1, 2018, in Szombathely's City Park.

The feast day of Blessed János Anasztáz Brenner is December 15.
