Dear St. Faustina Family,

On the path of Advent, we have come to the last Sunday—which this year is very particular: today, in the evening, we will be celebrating Christmas Night. In God's plan of salvation, the announcement of the Messi-

ah's promises culminates in the Annunciation of the Angel, which we hear in this weekend's Gospel. Jesus, the long-awaited one who frees men from the slavery that stalks them, would be born of Mary. This is the most important proclamation in the history of salvation, addressed to a young Virgin of the lineage of David, in fulfilment of the promise heard in the First Reading.

The Nativity of the Lord — Great Expectations by Tom Schmidt, Diocesan Publications Writer

Christmas can be disappointing. We remember the Christmases from our childhood, all the joy, the excitement,

and the fun we had. When we grow up, we have to shop for gifts, write and mail the cards, put up the decorations, and do all the preparations that seem to stress us out. We may be sad that the day did not meet our expectations. Now that most of that is done, (unless you are reading this on a break from cleaning house before the grandkids arrive) we can reflect on how the first Christmas upset all expectations.

I'm sure Joseph never expected to have a child so soon. Or to have the baby born in a stable miles from their home in Nazareth. The shepherds never expected to be awakened by angels. And those Jews who looked forward to the coming of a Messiah never expected him to come as a baby. Yet God had reasons for coming in this way.



The nativity scene looks so peaceful and beautiful, but the reality was not so romantic. The messiah came not to the sound of war horns, but the cry of a helpless infant. He was born in a stable because no one had room for him. The first to see him were the shepherds, the migrant workers of the time. The political leaders (Herod and friends) wanted to kill him.

Jesus was born in this way to show that he came not for the important and wealthy, but for the poor and outcast. As an adult, he would continue to surprise: he ate with sinners and tax collectors; he challenged the religious leaders of Israel. He was executed as a criminal.

So today he continues to come to us in the homeless, the undocumented immigrant", the sick, those in prison, the unborn infant, that we might find him where we least expect. Can we learn to see him in the unexpected, in our trials and difficulties, our own weaknesses? When we do, we will celebrate what Christmas is truly about. Page 5

The Twelve Days of Christmas By Marylu Mariniello

For centuries, England was a Catholic country, converted to the faith by St. Boniface and his family, all of whom are saints



too. Then in 1534, Henry VIII broke off from the Catholic church to form his own church because he wanted an annulment from his wife Catherine and the Pope would not grant this.

Besides creating the Church of England, Henry and his followers also destroyed Catholic churches, monasteries, works of art, statues and more. Anyone who was a Catholic was subject to death, especially priests. Many Catholics turned to the new English church to survive, but many more stayed faithful, having Masses said in private, protecting priests and following their traditions, but they were often betrayed by servants or even someone from their own family.

Henry's daughter Elizabeth I who succeeded him, was even worse than her father with intolerance. English Catholics were not allow to vote or to own property. They couldn't be wit-

nesses in court or own a firearm. Everyone was ordered to attend Protestant services and if people did not attend, they were fined and/or imprisoned. All Catholic schools were shut down and no one was allowed to learn anything about the Catholic religion. In order to work in a civil office, a person had to take an oath stating that he or she denounced the Pope and had no belief in transubstantiation. All of these laws were active until April of 1829, when King George IV signed the Emancipation Bill, which granted political and religious freedom to Catholics. Still to this day, no queen or king of England can be a Catholic. Remember that these same penal laws were enforced in Virginia until the Revolutionary War took place. It is also interesting that Oliver Cromwell, who lead a Puritan Parliament, outlawed Christmas during the years of 1642 until 1660.

There is a belief that the song "The Twelve Days of Christmas," which is an English Christmas carol, was written as code for the Catholics at that time who were not permitted to practice their faith openly. The Twelve Days of Christmas start on Christmas Day and end at the Epiphany in January.

This carol was a "catechism" song for young Catholics. It had two levels of meaning. The first was the surface meaning. Then there was a hidden meaning known only to Catholics of that time. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious truth which children could remember

The song begins with "On the first day of Christmas, my true love sent to me a partridge in a pear tree."

The "True Love" written in the song is for Jesus Christ because he is love and was born on Christmas Day. The partridge in the pear tree is also representative because this bird is willing to sacrifice its life if necessary to protect its young by feigning injury to draw away predators.

For the other lyrics, there is great meaning too:

The two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments in the Bible.

The three French hens stood for faith, hope and love and also for the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

The four calling birds symbolized the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

The five golden rings were for the first five books of the Old Testament, known as the "Pentateuch", Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy.

The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represented the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit: Wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord

The eight maids a-milking were for the Eight Beatitudes.

The Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit: Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control and also for the Nine Choirs of Angels.

The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments.

The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful Apostles.

The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of doctrine in The Apostles' Creed.

Many disparage this theory saying the song began in France in 1780, but others believe and like the thought of the hidden lessons.

When the lyric says "my true love gave to me," it means gifts from God. There is a lot of repetition in this song which emphasizes the continuous renewal of God's love.

So as we prepare for Christmas and listen to Christmas music, keep in mind the faithfulness of the oppressed people who learned this song and thank God for our freedoms.

A Merry and Blessed Christmas to everyone.
