Dear Parish Community of St. Faustina,

The Third Sunday of Advent is known as Gaudette Sunday, which means, Rejoice Sunday. The time of the Lord's coming

is very near. In today's Gospel we come in contact once again with John the Baptist, who is preaching and baptizing along the Jordan river. The baptism he is offering is one of repentance in preparation for the coming of the Messiah, who's arrival is very much near. With a sense of urgency, John the Baptist is issuing a call: "Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said.

The word "Grace" means Gift. This Supernatural Gift is not for John the Baptist to give. The only one that can offer this Gift is the Messiah, the Son of the living God. That is why John is simply issuing a loud cry in the wilderness of the Jordan dessert, to repent and prepare for Christ's coming.

The color of the vestments Father John, Deacon Chris and I are wearing this Third Sunday of Advent matches the rose candle in our Advent wreath. It accentuates the loud cry given by John in the desert. This wakeup call should stir in our hearts a desire to seek justice, truth, and peace, as we await the coming of the Lord.

Finding justice, peace, and truth in our daily lives is a blessed opportunity that connect us with the one and only lifegiving Gift. This Gift was given to us at our Baptism. The Gift is God's Grace! May we never lose sight of it as we echo the words of John in our own surroundings, inviting others to rejoice and prepare for the coming of the Lord. Ánimo.

Gaudete Sunday, by Beth Price of Diocesan Publications

Rejoicing is the theme of today's readings on this Gaudete Sunday. We are filled with joy, because the Lord is coming and is almost here! "God is the joy of my soul," the prophet Isaiah says in the first reading. He truly is my joy, my God, my all.



I have joy because I know what is to come. My Savior, Jesus Christ, will soon be born again. Joy beams in the broad smile that instantly bursts onto my face when I see a friend or family member. I feel joy hearing a child giggle or an adult unexpectedly laugh out loud. I rejoice knowing that the love of the Lord is really present in my life and in the world.

Being human, there are many times that I forget that joy. The words proclaimed in the first reading remind me to make my ways straight, to prepare for His

presence in the world and most importantly, in my life. I need to be intimately aware of this Companion on my journey during the highs and lows and turns and twists of life, the gift of Christ Jesus and the Holy Spirit.

The "O Antiphons", which begin annually on the 17th of December, are seven ancient refrains that proclaim titles of the Messiah going back to the 4th century. They are sung or prayed during evening prayer before the Magnificat during the days leading up to Christmas Eve. Each speaks about the coming of the Messiah from prophets of the Old Testament.

"O Wisdom" is today's refrain before the Gospel. "O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!" I have joy in the wisdom and knowledge of what is to come: my Savior, Jesus Christ. I am aware of the joy of anticipation of a birth or new beginning. It is the gift of metanoia, a change of heart to begin anew with the graces given to me through His humble birth to Mary.

May my soul rejoice in my Lord and Savior! May I be granted a metanoia of heart and spirit to grow in wisdom and knowledge that leads me closer to the glory and wonder of God. Amen!

St. John of Kanty By Marylu Mariniello


John Cantius was born in Kęty, a small town near Oświęcim, Poland. His parents were Anna and Stanisław Kanty.

Not much is known about his childhood, but as a young adult he attended the Kraków Academy, receiving a bachelor's

degree and then a Doctorate Degree in Philosophy in 1418. He was a philosophy teacher at the university level for the next three years, while preparing for the priest-hood.

After he was ordained, John became the rector at the school of the Canons Regular of the Most Holy Sepulcher in Miechow. Then he was offered a professorship of *Sacra Scriptura* (Holy Scripture) back at Kraków Academy, his alma mater. Years later the Academy would be renamed Jagiellonian University, where Pope John Paul II attended.

John attained a Doctorate in Theology and became the Director of the Theology department, maintaining this professorship until his death in 1473. He spent many hours copying manuscripts of the Holy Scriptures, theological writings and other religious works. Twenty six volumes have survived, with a total of eighteen thousand pages. He was also proficient in physics, helping develop Jean Buridan's Theory of Impetus, which predated the works of Galileo and Newton. At this time, he made one pilgrimage to Jerusalem, hoping to become a martyr and four pilgrimages to Rome, all on foot.



While he was at Kraków, Father John became well known for his generosity and compassion toward the poor, especially the poor students at the university. He ate

meagerly, giving his money to those in need. With all of his wonderful traits, he was also the victim of hate and gossip. Rivals resented John's popularity with the students and brought a false charge against him. Father John was thrown out of the university, not even being allowed to appear at his own hearing or to testify in his own defense. Now he was forty one years old and an apprentice pastor, sent to Olkusz in Bohemia in 1431.

The new congregation was suspicious of their new pastor, assuming that he was a big city professor who would not think well of their small town in the country. They also believed that they inherited a priest who was "in disgrace." But Father John was determined to win them over and not dwell on what was done to him. He was nervous, but his plan was to show love and concern to everyone. It took years to win their approval. He was never impatient or unkind, but the people were still hostile, eventually coming to love him.

Father was exonerated after eight years and went back to teach at Kraków. As he was leaving his Church, the oncehostile people followed him for several miles, begging him to stay.

Father John spent the rest of his life as a professor of Sacred Scripture at the university. He was well-liked and often was invited to dinner with nobility. Once he was sitting down to dinner when he saw a beggar walking outside. He stood up and ran out, giving the man the food in his bowl and then went back inside.

This was the philosophy that Father taught his students - "Fight all error, but do it with good humor, patience, kindness, and love. Harshness will damage your own soul and spoil the best cause."

Father John died at the age of eighty three in December 1473. His remains were buried in the Collegiate Church of St. Anne, becoming a popular pilgrimage site. In 1992, he became the patron of the diocese of Bielsko-Żywiec and also for the students.

John Cantius was beatified by Pope Clement X on March 28, 1676. In 1737, Pope Clement XII named him the patron saint of Poland and Lithuania and he was canonized on July 16, 1767 by Pope Clement XIII.

Pope John Paul II had a deep and lifelong devotion to St. John of Kanty, whose feast day is December 23. St. John Kanty is the patron saint of teachers, students, priests and pilgrims.

This is his prayer:

St. John of Kanty, you were unjustly fired from your work. Please pray for those who are jobless or in danger of losing their jobs that they may find work that is fulfilling in every way. Guide us to ways to help those looking for work. Amen.
