

# A Message from Father Carlos - Un Mensaje de Padre Carlos

My Dear Family of St. Faustina,

Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family. It could not be otherwise: if the Son of God has become one of us, he must

be born, live and grow in the bosom of a family, that of Joseph and Mary. The Word of God thus presents the family as an important nucleus in the development of the person. In the Family of Nazareth we discover that every family is called to be a home that welcomes, accompanies and heals. The Solemnity of the Holy Family has been in existence for just over a century: it was established by Pope Leo XIII to give Christian families an evangelical model of life. The example of the family of Nazareth moves us today to live in a different way.

We have heard in the Gospel: "The child grew and strengthened and was filled with wisdom; and the grace of God was with him" (Lk 2:40). This means that Jesus, even in the years he lived in Nazareth, lives up to his name: Saviour. Therefore, the time of Nazareth is a time of salvation. The art of living as Christians in a family consists in shaping our hearts in the style of Jesus: to accept life as a gift and to place hope and trust in God, the only Saviour. In this way, the family will be a school where one learns to always seek God's will, in simplicity, generosity, respect, solidarity, patience, acceptance of weaknesses.



Yes, brothers and sisters, at the center of this Christmas Sunday is the simple and great family of Nazareth. Today we also bid farewell to the year 2023 to give way to 2024 tomorrow and with the new year the celebration of Mary, Mother of God. I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you who in one way or another are salt and light, all the servants in our Parish, all of you are Jesus to me and to the rest of our parish family! Our most precious Christmas gift! May the blessings, the peace, the love, the enjoyment, be forever in your hearts and in the hearts of all you love. My brothers and sisters, I think about 2024 and I can only think of many greater blessings that God has in store for us! Animo!




# St. André Bessette

Alfred Bessette was born on August 9, 1845 in Mont-Saint-Grégoire, Québec, Canada, a small town twenty five miles southeast of Montreal. His father was Isaac Bessette, a carpenter and lumberman and his mother Clothilde Foisy was a homemaker and oversaw the education of the children. He was the eighth of twelve children. Four of his siblings died in infancy. Alfred was extremely frail at birth,

being baptized the following day. In 1849, the family moved to Farnham, Quebec for work for his father as a lumberman, who was killed by a falling tree when Alfred was nine years old, His mother was now forty years old, taking care of her children, but she died of tuberculosis within three years. Alfred became an orphan at the age of twelve.

He was then placed under the care of Timothée and Rosalie Nadeau of Saint-Césaire, Quebec following his mother's death. There he attended catechetical lessons taught by his parish's pastor, André Provençal, where he developed his two lifelong devotions to the Passion of Christ and to St. Joseph. He was confirmed at the age of twelve and started school at fourteen, but soon left because he had learning difficulties. His foster father Timothée wanted Alfred to become a laborer since he felt that an orphan didn't need to be educated. Then Alfred went to live with Louis Ouimet, the mayor of Saint-Césaire. Now he worked at a series of occupations, including farming, tinsmith, blacksmith, wheelwright, cobbler and baker, all which were too difficult for him to do because he was physically weak. Searching for work, Alfred moved to Moosup, Connecticut when he was eighteen. He joined several of his relatives who worked at textile mills across Connecticut and Rhode Island, but he returned to Canada in 1867 following the creation of the Canadian Confederation.



André Provençal was the pastor of the parish where Alfred now attended and saw the devotion and generosity of the young man. He decided to write a note to the Superior of the Congregation of Holy Cross in Montreal, saying "I'm sending you a saint." Alfred was initially rejected by the order because of frail health, but Archbishop Ignace Bourget of Montreal intervened on his behalf. In 1872, Alfred was accepted and entered the novitiate of the congregation, receiving the religious name of Brother André, which was how he was known for the rest of his life. He made his final vows on February 2, 1874 at the age of 28.

The Holy Cross Brothers were teachers, yet Alfred still did not know how to read and write. After taking his vows, Brother André was sent to Notre Dame College in Montreal as a porter.

His responsibilities were to answer the door, welcome guests and unite them with the people they were visiting, wake up the students, serve in the laundry room and deliver mail. He was also the Sacristan. Brother André joked later, "At the end of my novitiate, my superiors showed me the door, and I stayed there for forty years."

Brother André had great confidence in St. Joseph. When he visited the sick, he would rub the person with oil from a lamp at the college chapel and pray to St. Joseph for them. Many claimed that they were cured through these prayers and they were grateful, but Brother refused to take any credit. All he wanted was to have a chapel built for St. Joseph.

An epidemic broke out at a nearby college and Brother André volunteered to nurse the sick. No one died. Soon people flocked to see him, making his superiors uneasy. Diocesan authorities were suspicious of him and doctors called him a quack, but Brother said. "I do not cure, Saint Joseph cures." Tensions increased at the college with so many of the sick people coming to see Brother André, causing school officials to forbid his ministry. He was permitted to receive the sick in the nearby tramway station instead of the college. His reputation spread, making him a controversial figure. There were many brothers in the Congregation as well as teachers and parents of students at the College who supported him, but many opposed him and considered him dangerous to the well-being of the school's reputation because they thought that he was a charlatan. Others were concerned for the health of the students, fearing the diseases carried by the sick who met with him.

In 1904, Brother André asked the Archbishop of Montreal if he could build a chapel for St. Joseph on the mountain near the college. The Archbishop would only give him permission to build a site with the money that Brother had, which was earned by giving haircuts and from a sign stating "Donations for St. Joseph." It was only a few hundred dollars, but Brother André built a small wood shelter fifteen feet by eighteen feet. He kept collecting money and went back three years later to request additional building, saying "I have only my great devotion to St. Joeph to guide me." He received the permission and added a roof so that all the people who were coming to hear Mass would be covered from rain or snow. Then walls were added as well as heating and a paved road was built leading to the mountain. This was now a shelter for pilgrims and a place where Brother André and others could live and take care of the shrine.

Many came and through kindness, caring, and devotion, Brother André helped people experience healing and renewal.

Eventually, he needed four secretaries to handle the 80,000 letters he received each year. Soon he started to build a Basilica but the Depression interfered. At ninety years old he told his co-workers to place a statue of St. Joseph in the unfinished, unroofed Basilica. He was very sick and had to be carried up the mountain to see the statue in its new home. Brother André died soon after on January 6, 1937 and didn't live to see the work on the Basilica completed. One million people filed past his coffin.

Brother André Bessette was declared venerable in 1978 and was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 1982. Pope Benedict XVI canonized him on October 17, 2010.

St. André Bessette is the first Canadian living after the Confederation to be canonized. The feast day for St. André Bessette is January 6 and he is the patron saint of the rejected.

This is his prayer:

"Blessed Brother André, your devotion to Saint Joseph is an inspiration to us. You gave your life selflessly to bring the message of his life to others. Pray that we may learn from Saint Joseph, and from you, what it is like to care for Jesus and do his work in the world. Amen."


