

A Message from Father Carlos - Un Mensaje de Padre Carlos

My Dear Family of St. Faustina,

We have now reached the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Already the Child Jesus appears to us great, he appears as the Messiah, the Master, the Prophet who speaks on behalf of God to humanity. This week's readings tell us about the power of God's Word and the authority with which Jesus spoke.

Through Moses, in the first reading, God announces that the Perfect Prophet will come, who will speak with the same authority as God because he will make God himself present. We should ask ourselves: How does our heart receive this news? Do we let it transform us?

St. Paul today gives us an assessment of the vocation of the married and the single; making a special appreciation for those who dedicate their singleness to take care of the things of the Lord. In his zeal for the spread of the Gospel, Paul exhorts his readers to consecrate themselves to celibacy in order to be fully available to God. We should ask ourselves: What goes on in our hearts as we listen to this Word? Do we create an environment among our sons and daughters where they can speak of a vocation to the total service of God and his Church?



The evangelist Mark assures us that Jesus is the greatest expositor of God's Word. He teaches with his own authority and not vicarious or delegated, so that even demons have to admit his holiness and the power of his word. The authority in Jesus' teaching contrasts with the usual verbiage of scribes and doctors accustomed to talking a lot and saying little. Jesus of Nazareth had a direct, strong and accessible teaching capacity. The gospel teaches us to believe in the supreme authority of Jesus, our Master.

Today, tomorrow and always, the Word of Jesus astonishes those who listen to him, liberates and rescues those who listen to him. All the power of His Word lies in its effectiveness, in its capacity for transformation as we listen, read, study, meditate and put it into practice. It is by listening to the Word that God becomes present and heals. Let us open our ears, minds, and hearts, let us look at how Jesus speaks to us, and how we listen to him. Animo!

En su ardor por la difusión del Evangelio, Pablo exhorta a sus lectores a consagrarse al celibato para estar, así, totalmente disponibles a Dios. Deberíamos preguntarnos: ¿Qué pasa en nuestro corazón mientras escuchamos esta Palabra? ¿Creamos un ambiente entre nuestros hijos e hijas donde se pueda hablar de vocación al servicio total de Dios y de su Iglesia?

El evangelista Marcos nos asegura que Jesús es el más grande expositor de la Palabra de Dios. El enseña con autoridad propia y no vicaria o delegada, de modo que hasta los demonios tienen que admitir su santidad y el poder de su palabra. La autoridad en la enseñanza de Jesús contrasta con la palabrería habitual de escribas y doctores acostumbrados a hablar mucho y a decir poco. Jesús de Nazaret, tenía una capacidad de enseñanza directa, fuerte y asequible. El Evangelio nos enseña a creer en la suprema autoridad de Jesús, nuestro Maestro.

Hoy, mañana y siempre la Palabra de Jesús, asombra a los que lo escuchan, libera y rescata a los que le hacen caso. Todo el poder de la su Palabra radica en su eficacia, en su capacidad de transformación mientras la escuchamos, leemos, estudiamos, meditamos y la ponemos en práctica. 

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14. The Masses and Service schedule for that day are as follows:

English Mass at 8:00 am Service with Ashes at 12:00 pm Bilingual Mass at 7:00 pm

ASHES WILL BE DISTRIBUTED <u>ONLY</u> AT THE MASSES AND AT THE SERVICE.

According to the United States Conference of Bishops, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In

addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

FASTING is understood as having one normal meal during the day. Water and medications do not break the fast. **ABSTINENCE** is not eating meat or anything with meat by-products (such as soup broth, for an example).

Catholics over 59 are exempt from the full requirements of the traditional Catholic fasting rule. According to the Catholic Church, those who are over the age of 59, along with those who are physically or mentally ill, are not required to fast or abstain from eating meat on days of religious obligation. The law of fasting applies to those from 18 to 59 years of age, but *abstinence from meat starting at the age of 14 has no upper age limit.*

St. Faustina proudly presents Brother Louis Canter, OEF, who will present "Celebrating the Triduum and the gift of the Paschal Mystery" on Sunday, February 18 through Tuesday, February 20th for the parish's Three-Day Lenten Mission. The events of all three nights begin at 7:00 pm in the church.

On Sunday evening there will be a 75-minute concert of song, prayer and stories focusing on the Gospels from Cycle A





of the last Sunday of Lent.

Monday features "A Glimpse of Holy Thursday and Good Friday. The topics that will be discussed are prayer, signs, symbols, and purpose of Holy Thursday, and the fulfillment of Jesus' obedience to the Father and its effects for us as a result of Good Friday.

Tuesday night's mission conclusion features prayer and the "Unpacking of the Easter Vigil" as we look at each section and how it reveals our Salvation through God's love and mercy.

Brother Canter, who recently retired from full-time ministry as Coordinator of Pastoral Care for four parishes in the Diocese of Orlando, has spent most of his life as a Pastoral Musician, which has afforded him the opportunity to minister in a wide variety of parishes that had many multi-cultural facets to them. The combination of both Pastoral Musician and Pastoral Ministry makes Louis a great resource in Liturgy and Music. He is currently the Composer in Residence for the Lutheran Franciscans.

KNIGHTS' NEWS—Our St. Faustina Knights of Columbus reported the following accomplishments at their January 2024 meeting:



The council participated in Central Florida Laps 4 Life last March 4, 2023. They raised 770 + 100 grant from the Supreme, then donated the amount to South Lake

Pregnancy & Family Care Center. The Memorial Monument of the Unborn Dedication was held on July 23, 2023. The Engraved Brick Fundraiser, to date, has a total of \$8,000 donated to the parish. Our parishioners, through the Knights, contributed \$1,529.53 on the Baby Bottle Drive with all the funds donated to South Lake Pregnancy & Family Care Center. The Knights donated \$1,000 to Bishop Grady Villas. The council voted to donate the amount from the council's fund as the Tootsie Roll Drive, which did not materialize last year. They took the initiative to purchase and install solar powered lights to the St. Faustina Sign close to the highway. Work is presently ongoing to repair the "kinks". The Council participated in our parish's Ministry Fair. Our Knights were honored to host the St. Joseph Icon as part of the Knight of Columbus Icon Prayer Program. St. Brigid of Ireland By Marylu Mariniello

Brigid was born in 451 in Faughart in the Kingdom of Ulaid, the child of the slave Brocca. Her father was a Leinster chieftain named Dubthach. The legend is that her mother was baptized by St. Patrick. Her father was married, so his wife then sold Brocca to a Druid landowner. All through her childhood, Brigid was known as a saintly child, with different positive petitions received through her prayers. She lived with her mother for ten years and then returned to her father's home.

Brigid continued her holy life in her new home, donating many of her father's possessions to the poor, which infuriated him. He took Brigid to the king of Leinster to sell her. While he was speaking to the king, Brigid gave her father's jeweled sword to a beggar so he could sell it for food for his family. The king was a Christian, who recognized her heart and convinced Dubthach to give her freedom by saying, "Her merit before God is greater than ours."

Then she returned to live with her mother, who was in charge of the Druid's dairy. Brigid began to work in the dairy and gave away milk, but the dairy still prospered. The Druid eventually freed Brocca. Now Brigid went back again to live with her fa-



ther, who had arranged for her to marry a pagan, which she refused. She made a vow to become a nun, praying that her beauty would be gone so that one would want to marry her. Her prayer was answered. After she made her final vows, her beauty was restored. St. Patrick recognized her sanctity, saying "So be it, my son, she is destined for great things."

Very little is known about Brigid's life after she entered the convent, but in the year 40, she founded a monastery in Kildare, called the Church of the Oak, also known as "Cill-Dara." It was built above a pagan shrine to a Celtic goddess, underneath an oak tree. There she and seven friends organized a communal religious life for women in Ireland. Then she founded two monastic institutions, one for men and one for women. Brigid invited a hermit named Conleth to help her in Kildare and be the spiritual pastor. He later became a saint. It was reported that Brigid chose St. Conleth "to govern the church along with herself."

Later, Brigid founded a school of art which included metalwork and illumination. Conleth led this endeavor also. It was here at this school that the Book of Kildare was beautifully written, but was lost three centuries ago. The Gerald of Wales praised the book as "the work of angelic, and not human skill."

There is evidence that Brigid was a good friend of St. Patrick. The Trias Thaumaturga claimed, "Between St. Patrick and Brigid, the pillars of the Irish people, there was so great a friendship of charity that they had but one heart and one mind. Through him and through her Christ performed many great works."

Brigid helped many people in her lifetime. She died of natural causes on February 1, 525. Her body was initially kept to the right of the high altar of Kildare Cathedral, with a tomb "adorned with gems and precious stones and crowns of gold and silver." In 878, the Scandinavians raided Ireland, so her relics were moved to the tomb of St. Patrick and St. Co-lumba, co-patron saints of Ireland.

In 1185, John de Courcy relocated her remains to Down Cathedral. Also, some relics were sent to the Church of St. John the Baptist in Lumiar, Portugal. The tomb there bears the inscription, "Here in these three tombs lie the three Irish knights who brought the head of St. Brigid, Virgin, a native of Ireland, whose relic is preserved in this chapel. In memory of which, the officials of the Altar of the same Saint caused this to be done in January AD 1283." Other relics were sent to St. Bridget's Church in Killester.

St. Brigid is a co-patron saint of Ireland, along with St. Patrick and St. Columba and the patron saint of dairymaids, cattle, poetry, midwives, Irish nuns and newborn babies. She is often depicted holding a reed cross, a crozier or a lamp. Her feast day is February 1 and she is also known as St. Brigid of Kildare.

This is her prayer: Brigid of the Mantle, encompass us, Lady of the Lambs, protect us, Keeper of the Hearth, kindle us. Beneath your mantle, gather us, And restore us to memory. Mothers of our mother, Foremothers strong. Guide our hands in yours.
