



St. Stephen


The name Stephen comes from the Greek language.


Stephen was a foreign-born Jew, a Hellenist, who lived in Jerusalem and spoke Greek. This is written in The Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 6, but no one knows when he was born. A big complaint among the Hellenists was that their widows

were neglected by most of the other Hebrews. This led the Apostles to create deacons to attend to this matter. Stephen was one of the seven deacons, who was also a great speaker and evangelist. He was the oldest and given the title of "Archdeacon," He often spoke in the synagogues, provoking the Jewish clergy, who had him summoned before the Sanhedrin. Stephen was charged with speaking against "this holy place and the law."

Stephen was very wise, detailing the history of Israel and outlining the blessings God had bestowed upon his chosen people. He also explained how disobedient Israel had become, despite the goodness and mercy of the Lord. Stephen explained that Jesus had come to fulfill the law of Moses, not destroy it. He quoted considerably from the Hebrew scriptures to prove his case. For this, he was accused of blasphemy and speaking against God and Moses. These charges inflamed the local people who demanded Stephen be tried and punished. When he was put on trial, many false witnesses were interviewed by the Sanhedrin to testify that Stephen was guilty of blasphemy. Then he was charged with predicting that Jesus would destroy the Temple and for preaching against Mosaic law.

Stephen reprimanded the Sanhedrin, saying, "You stiff-necked people, uncircumcised in heart and ears, you always oppose the holy Spirit; you are just like your ancestors. Which of the prophets did your ancestors not persecute? They put to death those who foretold the coming of the





While he was being brutally stoned, Stephen spoke his last words saying, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit. Lord, do not hold this sin against them." Words which echoed the very words of Jesus on the Cross. Following this, Stephen died.

His forgiving words are written in the Acts of the Apostles 7:59-60, which are similar to the words Christ said at His crucifixion (Luke 23:34).

A man named Saul of Tarsus was a Rabbi who watched this murder. He was very anti-Christian, having killed many. But a short while later, he met Jesus on the road to Damascus, was thrown off of his horse and then lost his sight. Christ then asked him why he did these horrible things. This meeting convinced Saul to convert to Christianity and change his name to Paul, becoming one of the most revered saints, writing epistles, championing the faith, converting people and dying a martyr's death. This encounter is recorded in the Acts of the Apostles, Chapter nine.

St. Stephen became the first Christian martyr. He died in the year 36 AD and his feast day is December 26. He is the patron saint of deacons, altar servers, bricklayers, casket makers and stonemasons. He is often depicted with a Gospel Book, a miniature church, stones and a martyr's palm frond.

In 415 a priest claimed he had a vision of a tomb and located St. Stephen's remains. A name inside the tomb confirmed this.

Deacon Keith Fournier wrote this prayer to St. Stephen:

Lord Jesus, you chose Stephen as the first deacon and martyr of your One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church. The heroic witness of his holy life and death reveals your continued presence among us. Through following the example of his living faith, and by his intercession, empower us by your Holy Spirit to live as witnesses to the faith in this New Missionary Age.

No matter what our state in life, career or vocation, help us to proclaim, in both word and in deed, the fullness of the Gospel to a world which is waiting to be born anew in Jesus Christ. Pour out upon your whole Church, the same Holy Spirit which animated St Stephen, Martyr, to be faithful to the end, which is a beginning of life eternal in the communion of the Trinity.
