Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

All who heard it were amazed by what had been told them by the shepherds. And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart. (Lk 2:19-19)

January 1st marks the end of one calendar year and the beginning of another. So, too, the birth of Jesus marks the end of the reign of sin and the beginning of a new era of God's grace. As Paul explains to the Galatians in today's second reading, Jesus was born of a woman just as we were, like us in all things but sin. By adoption, we are children of God and children of our Blessed Mother.

Today's feast, the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, arises from the settling of a controversy among our early Christian ancestors. There were arguments about the divinity of Christ and the role that Mary plays in the story of salvation. Nestorius was the patriarch of Constantinople in the 5th century. He taught that Mary was the mother only of Jesus' humanity.

Although Scripture says, in the chapter before today's Gospel reading, *nothing will be impossible for God*, Nestorius did not think a mortal could bear the immortal, a human could not bring forth the divine. Nestorius left out the wondrous works of God in his thought process, and how our God can do or achieve anything he desires, solely because he desires that it be so.

If we embrace an image of God who makes all things possible, then these things are true: Mary is the Mother of Jesus, Jesus is God, and therefore as the mother of Jesus, Mary is *the Mother of God*. To deny the holiness of Mary and her rightful place as Mother of God is to downplay the divinity and perfection of her Son and our Savior, Jesus Christ.

When the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to ransom those under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. (Gal. 4:4)

Todos los que lo oyeron quedaron asombrados por lo que les habían dicho los pastores. Y María guardaba todas estas cosas, reflexionando sobre ellas en su corazón. (Lc 2,19-19)

El 1 de enero marca el final de un año calendario y el comienzo de otro. Así también, el nacimiento de Jesús marca el fin del reino del pecado y el comienzo de una nueva era de la gracia de Dios. Como Pablo explica a los gálatas en la segunda lectura de hoy, Jesús nació de una mujer tal como nosotros, como nosotros en todo menos en el pecado. Por adopción, somos hijos de Dios e hijos de nuestra Santísima Madre.

La fiesta de hoy, la Solemnidad de María, la Santa Madre de Dios, surge del arreglo de una controversia entre nuestros primeros antepasados cristianos. Hubo discusiones sobre la divinidad de Cristo y el papel que juega María en la historia de la salvación. Nestorio fue el patriarca de Constantinopla en el siglo V. Enseñó que María era la madre únicamente de la humanidad de Jesús. Aunque la Escritura dice, en el capítulo anterior al Evangelio de hoy, nada será imposible para Dios, Nesto rius no pensó que un mortal pudiera dar a luz lo inmortal, un humano no podría dar a luz lo divino. Nestorio dejó de lado las maravillosas obras de Dios en su proceso de pensamiento, y cómo nuestro Dios puede hacer o lograr cualquier cosa que desee, únicamente porque desea que así sea.

Si abrazamos una imagen de Dios que hace posible todas las cosas, entonces estas cosas son verdaderas: María es la Madre de Jesús, Jesús es Dios, y por lo tanto, como madre de Jesús, María es la Madre de Dios. Negar la santidad de María y el lugar que le corresponde como Madre de Dios es restar importancia a la divinidad y perfección de su Hijo y nuestro Salvador, Jesucristo.

Cuando vino la plenitud de los tiempos, Dios envió a su Hijo, nacido de mujer, nacido bajo la ley, para rescatar a los que estaban bajo la ley, a fin de que recibiésemos la adopción de hijos. (Gálatas 4:4)

St. Basil the Great and St. Gregory Nazianzen

St. Basil the Great

The feast day of Saints Basil the Great and Gregory Nazianzen is celebrated on January 2. The two were students together and friends who were strong advocates of orthodoxy when the church was facing the Arian heresy, which denied the Divinity of Christ.

Basil was born in Caesarea in Cappadocia in 329, in what is now southeastern Turkey. His family has many saints: his grandfather was a martyr in the Roman persecution and his grandmother, mother, sister and two brothers are all canonized saints.

Basil was studying to become a teacher when he decided to follow a different path. For a while, he lived as a hermit and then founded a monastery in Asia Minor. His principles still influence Eastern monasticism to this day. He was a gifted speaker, with writings which place him among the greatest teachers of the Church.

Basil became the Bishop of Caesarea in 370. He opposed the Emperor Valens when the Emperor pressured him to stay silent and give Holy Communion to Arians, but Basil persevered and the Emperor backed down. St. Athanasius of Alexandria was a staunch opposer of Arianism. When he died in 373, this battle fell to Basil. His enemies were jealous and accused him of ambition and heresy.

Basil died on January 1, 379. The Council of Chalcedon, recognized the great sanctity of Basil and his heroic defense of the faith seventy-two years after his death, calling him "the great Basil, minister of grace who has expounded the truth to the whole earth."

St. Gregory Nazianzen

Gregory Nazianzen was born in 330 in Cappadocia and was baptized at the age of thirty. His parents were Christian converts, who gave Gregory a strong education, including religious studies. His father was also named Gregory and was the bishop of Nazianzus. For a while Gregory was a hermit, but was later ordained to the priesthood, first working with his father and then assisting Basil for ten years in his opposition to Arianism.

Basil consecrated Gregory as the Bishop of Sasima in 381. Gregory presided over the Second Ecumenical Council of Constantinople which defined the Nicene Creed, the prayer that we still recite every Sunday at Mass.

Gregory was a gifted speaker and teacher. Jerome was one of his students, who later became St. Jerome and a Doctor of the Church. Gregory is also remembered for his speeches on St. Cyprian, St. Athanasius and the Maccabees and is famous for his sermons on the Holy Trinity. His last days were spent in austerity and solitude, while writing religious poetry, some of it which was autobiographical. He died on January 25, in the year 389 and was acclaimed simply as "the Theologian."

The greatest contribution of St. Basil and St. Gregory Nazianzen was how they defined, both fundamentally and conclusively, what the word Trinity actually means. They showed everyone how Jesus is both God and man and how the Holy Spirit is related to God the Father and God the Son. They opposed Arianism and rebuilt the faith in Constantinople, which caused a great deal of personal persecution.

Both are Doctors of the Church, two of the original four Doctors of the Eastern Church. The other two are St. Athanasius and St. John Chrysostom.

There are eight original Doctors of the Church. Four in the Eastern rite and four in the Western or Latin rite. The Western Doctors of the Church are St. Ambrose, St. Augustine, Pope St. Gregory the Great and St. Jerome.
