Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven. "(Matthew 5:12)

In today's Gospel, Jesus leads his disciples to the mountaintop and teaches the beatitudes, an entirely different point of view on suffering and discipleship than the worldly perspective. Blessed are those who are poor, meek, and mournful. Blessed are those who are merciful, clean-hearted, and make peace. Blessed are those who are insulted and persecuted. Suffering will not be the end for them, because they will be comforted, they will see God, they will be rewarded in the kingdom of heaven.



After hearing Jesus' words, the disciples are reassured that following Jesus is worth the cost - that good will have the last word. We, too, can adopt this beatitude point of view and see our suffering and hardship in a different way. Saint Paul tells us that *God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise*, and *the weak of the world to shame the strong*.

We do not have to be the wisest person, or the strongest person; we do not have to be "something" in the eyes of the world for we are everything in the eyes of the Lord.

It is due to him that you are in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, as well as righteousness, sanctification, and redemption, so that, as it is written, "Whoever boasts, should boast in the Lord."(1Cor 1:31)

Después de escuchar las palabras de Jesús, los discípulos se aseguran de que seguir a Jesús vale la pena el costo, que el bien tendrá la última palabra. Nosotros también podemos adoptar este punto de vista de bienaventuranza y ver nuestro sufrimiento y dificultades de una manera diferente. San Pablo nos dice que Dios eligió a los necios del mundo para avergonzar a los sabios, y a los débiles del mundo para avergonzar a los fuertes.

No tenemos que ser la persona más sabia, o la persona más fuerte; no tenemos que ser "algo" a los ojos del mundo, porque somos todo a los ojos del Señor.

Es debido a él que estáis en Cristo Jesús, que se convirtió para nosotros en sabiduría de Dios, así como justicia, santificación y redención, para que, como está escrito, "El que se gloríe, se gloríe en el Señor". (1 Corintios 1:31)



St. John Bosco

Giovanni Melchiorre Bosco was born in Becchi, Italy, on August 16, 1815. This was just after the end of the Napoleonic Wars which ravaged the area. Also a drought and a famine occurred at that same time. He was the youngest of three boys. His father died when John was two years old, leaving his mother, Margherita to raise her sons. Margherita Occhiena was a holy and devout woman, who was declared Venerable by the Church in 2006.

As he grew, John attended church and became very pious. He helped the family by growing food and raising sheep. Even



though the family was poor, they always shared what they had with the homeless who sometimes came to their home looking for food, shelter or clothing. When John was nine years old, he had the first of many vivid dreams which would guide his future. In his dream, he saw boys who swore as they played. He also saw a great, majestic man and woman. The man told him that he would "conquer these your friends" with meekness and charity. The lady said to "Be strong, humble and robust. When the time comes, you will understand everything." This dream influenced John for the rest of his life.

Soon afterwards, John witnessed a traveling troupe of circus performers. He was mesmerized by their magic tricks and acrobatics, realizing that if he learned their illusions, he could use them to attract others and hold their attention. So he studied them and learned how to perform some of the tricks. One evening, he staged a show for his playmates, which was well received. At the end of the show, he recited a homily that he heard earlier in the day, inviting his neighbors to pray with him. He kept giving shows and games as the days were passing, leading him to want to become a priest.

John's poverty prevented him from an education, but he still dreamed of becoming a priest. His older brother didn't like this, seeing John as disloyal, whipping him while saying he's "a farmer like us!" But John was undeterred. He left his home at the age of twelve to look for work as a hired farm laborer but had difficulty finding a job on a farm so he

settled for work at a vineyard. He was there for two years when he met Joseph Cafasso, a priest who was willing to help teach him and provide some books. Father Cafasso would later be recognized as a saint for his work, particularly ministering to prisoners and the condemned.

John entered the seminary in 1835, with six years of study and preparation. He was ordained a priest in 1841. His first assignment was in Turin in the slums with widespread poverty, working with the poor children. Father Bosco also visited prisons, noticing a large number of boys between the ages of twelve and eighteen who were imprisoned. The conditions were deplorable and he felt moved to do more to help other boys from going there, so he went into the streets and met with young men and boys where they worked and played. He used his talents as a performer, doing tricks to capture their attention, then sharing his message of the day.

When he was not preaching, Father Bosco worked tirelessly helping boys find work and searching for homes for others. His mother began to help him, becoming known as "Mamma Margherita." By the 1860s, Father Bosco and his mother were responsible for lodging 800 boys. He also negotiated new rights for boys who were employed as apprentices. Employers were abusing the apprentices, making them perform manual labor and menial tasks unrelated to their apprenticeship. Father Bosco negotiated contracts which stopped this mistreatment. The boys were also given feast days off and could no longer be beaten, which were sweeping reforms for this time. He identified boys whom he thought would make good priests and encouraged them to consider a vocation to the priesthood. Then he helped them to prepare for their path to ordination.

While he was doing good works, Father Bosco was accused of stealing boys from their parishes. The Chief of Police of Turin was opposed to Father catechizing boys in the streets, which he claimed was a political subversion. Father Bosco then established the Society of St. Francis de Sales in 1859. He organized fifteen seminarians and one teenage boy into the group. Their purpose was to carry on charitable works and help boys with their faith formation and to stay out of trouble. This organization still exists today and continues to help people, especially children around the world. One of his students was Dominic Savio, who was also canonized a saint. In the years that followed, Father Bosco expanded his mission, which still had a lot of work to do.

Father Bosco died on January 31, 1888. The call for his canonization was immediate. Pope Pius XI knew John Bosco personally and agreed, declaring him Blessed in 1929. He was canonized on Easter Sunday, 1934 and was given the title "Father and Teacher of Youth."

In 2002, Pope John Paul II was petitioned to declare St. John Bosco the Patron of Stage Magicians because had pioneered the art of what is called "Gospel Magic." This uses magic and other feats to attract attention and engage the youth.

St. John Bosco is the patron saint of apprentices, editors, publishers, schoolchildren, magicians and juvenile delinquents. His feast day is on January 31.
