# Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

I tell you, the latter went home justified, not the former; for whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted."(Lk. 18:14)

The Lord hears the cry of those humble enough to admit their need for him. He also hears the cry of... the tax collector. In the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector, the tax collector shares an important virtue with the poor and oppressed: humility. They have all been humbled, whether by lifes' circumstances or their own doing, and they willingly place themselves at the Lord's hands. The tax collector, too, has been humbled. Like the orphan and widow, he puts himself in God's hands. The Lord hears his cry, and he goes home justified.



The Lord hears the cry of the poor and the tax collector; but does he hear our prayers? The Lord knows no favorites, but he hears the cry of those who are humble enough to admit their need for him, their need for his mercy and redemption. He waits for us to need him - to long for him - so that he can be our strength and our salvation. When we pray, it is not to exalt ourselves as more worthy to be heard by him than others. Rather, when we pray it is to humble ourselves to be heard.

God's Son humbled himself to be one with us, to teach us to be humble and to place ourselves in God's hands, as he did when he surrendered himself to the cross. In this Eucharist, we recall his humility and seek the grace to be humble like him.

The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds; it does not rest till it reaches its goal, nor will it withdraw till the Most High responds, judges justly and affirms the right, and the Lord will not delay. (Sir 35:17-18)

El Señor escucha el clamor de aquellos lo suficientemente humildes como para admitir su necesidad de él. También escucha el grito de... el recaudador de impuestos. En la parábola del fariseo y el recaudador de impuestos, el recaudador de impuestos comparte una virtud importante con los pobres y oprimidos: la humildad. Todos ellos han sido humillados, ya sea por las circunstancias de la vida o por sus propias acciones, y voluntariamente se ponen a las manos del Señor. El recaudador de impuestos también ha sido humillado. Como el huérfano y la viuda, se pone en las manos de Dios. El Señor oye su clamor y se va a casa justificado.

El Señor escucha el clamor de los pobres y del recaudador de impuestos; pero ¿oye nuestras oraciones? El Señor no conoce favoritos, pero escucha el clamor de aquellos que son lo suficientemente humildes como para admitir su necesidad de él, su necesidad de su misericordia y redención. Él espera que lo necesitemos, que lo anhelemos, para que pueda ser nuestra fuerza y nuestra salvación. Cuando oramos, no es para exaltarnos a nosotros mismos como más dignos de ser escuchados por él que los demás. Más bien, cuando oramos es para humillarnos para ser escuchados.

El Hijo de Dios se humilló a sí mismo para ser uno con nosotros, para enseñarnos a ser humildes y a ponernos en las manos de Dios, como lo hizo cuando se entregó a la cruz. En esta Eucaristía, recordamos su humildad y buscamos la gracia de ser humildes como él.

La oración de los humildes traspasa las nubes; no descansa hasta que alcanza su meta, ni se retirará hasta que el Altísimo responda, juzgue con justicia y afirme lo correcto, y el Señor no se demore. (Señor 35:17-18)

**OUR BI-MONTHLY BLOOD DRIVE**, will be held **NEXT SUNDAY**, **October 30**, **from 7:30 am until 12:30 pm**. In the three-year history of this important outreach ministry, our parishioners have helped to save up to 1,008 lives by donating 336 pints of blood. Each donation has the ability to save up to three lives.

We had 18 pints donated during our August 28 drive. Our single -event donation record is 33, set last February. We have had 25 donations twice and have met our OneBlood goal in all but one of our drives since the ministry started on June 19, 2019.

## A Letter from Deacon Dennis Gillan

#### Greetings,

I am so happy to be able to share with all of you what I have experienced over the past month.

The following is a timeline as to what has happened in order to inform all of you.

During the first week of September I start experiencing abdominal pain on my left side when I would eat and also a sense of fullness. I was seldom able to finish a meal. I was also feeling tired. This persisted until September 14 when we decided I should go to the emergency room. We went to KSB in Dixon. They did a multitude of blood draws which resulted in the finding that my liver enzymes were critically high. I was transported via ambulance to Loyola Hospital in Maywood that same day because they do liver transplants. After 9 days in their facility my liver was deteriorating quickly. On Friday, September 23, having gone through all the pre-op testing to confirm that my heart would be strong enough to undergo transplant surgery I was placed on the transplant list around 11:00am. They had told us in advance that typically it would take between 1 to 6 weeks to find a donor. They also had warned that without a transplant I would not survive another 2 months. Unbelievably within 3 hours they had found a liver for me. As soon as we were notified that I would be having surgery that evening Nanette called all of our children and they along with their

spouses all arrived at the hospital before the surgery started. We were told the surgery would take 4 to 8 hours. Surgery began at 6:27p.m. and three and a half hours later my family were told that surgery went well and they were closing me up. I was taken to ICU and all of my family was able to see me before they were sent home to get some much needed rest. Things were beginning to look up. On Friday, September 30, I told my surgeon and transplant team that I did not want to spend another night in the hospital. I was discharged that afternoon. Nanette and I arrived home about 6:00p.m.

The past few days have been fabulous since I am home. Going forward, Nanette and I will be making weekly trips to Loyola for an indefinite time for more bloodwork, doctor's appointments and testing to ensure the liver is still functioning properly and to adjust all the medications I am on. I am on anti-rejection drugs which leave me immune comprised therefore I am not allowed to be in large crowds of people and should wear a mask when going out in public. It's like Covid guidelines have begun again for me. For the next three months I am not allowed to drive, lift anything heavier than a gallon of milk or over exert myself. Also for the next month I cannot go out to dinner or even order dinner out which means Nanette is going to be doing a lot of cooking. My new low sodium, low potassium diet is keeping her busy reading up on what I can and cannot have.

Sadly, I will not be able to be the up close, always willing to share a hug guy I was before. Please do not mistake this for being stand offish. I just have to be so very careful to not jeopardize my health or new liver.

This entire experience has been an emotional roller coaster for myself, Nanette and our family as I am sure you can imagine. I think at times we are all in shock when looking back over the past few weeks and going from what seemed to be a basically healthy person to a critical patient in need of a donor liver. I truly believe that it is only by the grace of God and his intervention that I am still here.

Our family and I are forever grateful to the family of the donor who so generously gave life to many other people including myself. We are all organ donors in our family and would like to take this opportunity to encourage any of you who are not to please consider signing up to be an organ donor too.

Thank you for allowing me to share my journey with you and I ask that you please keep the prayers coming because I still have a long way to go.

### Saints Simon and Jude


We remember Saints Simon and Jude, two of the apostles chosen by Jesus to accompany Him and minister to others. We know about them, but their recorded words are few and they lived in the shadows of the more well-known apostles. Still they became martyrs and saints, giving up their lives for the sake of the Lord.

St. Simon is also known as Simon the Zealot so there was no confusion with the name of St. Peter, also known as

Simon Peter. St. Simon is mentioned in Mark 3:18, Luke 6:15, with his voting to replace Judas in Acts 1 and when he is present at Pentecost in Acts 2:14. The Zealots were a Jewish radical sect which represented an extreme of Jewish nationalism, renouncing the domination of the Romans. Some of the Zealots were the spiritual heirs of the Maccabees, carrying on their ideals of religion and independence, being mostly responsible for the rebellion which ended in the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 AD.

It was thought that Simon belonged to the Zealots. Some say that Simon may have preached in Egypt, Cyrene, and Mauritania. His death was by crucifixion in Persia, but he is depicted with a saw in pictures, so some believed that he was martyred by being sawed in half. His symbols include a boat, cross, lance and saw. St. Simon is the patron saint of curriers, sawyers and tanners.

St. Jude was also St. Simon's companion and is called Jude Thaddaeus to help him from being confused with Judas Iscariot, the traitor. "Thaddaeus" means "courageous heart" or "one who praises." Originally, his name was also Judas, but because of the disgrace of that name, it was shortened to Jude. St. Jude is distinguished in John 4:22 as Judas but "not Iscariot" to avoid identification with the betrayer.



St. Jude was a relative of our Lord and is mentioned in Acts 1:13 and Luke 6:16 as "son of James" (the Lesser), as opposed to James, the brother of John. James the Lesser was the son of Alphaeus, probably a brother to St. Joseph, so Jude was a cousin of Jesus.

Not much is said about St. Jude in Scripture, but he does have one line attributed to him at the Last Supper when he asks: "Master, [then] what happened that you will reveal yourself to us and not to the world?" (John 14:22) Jesus answered and said to him, "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him." (John 14:23).

St. Jude is credited with writing the Letter of Jude, a very short epistle which comes before the Book of Revelation. Jude's letter says to remain faithful to Christ and avoid false teachers encouraging lust and corruption, leading to damnation

He challenges the faithful to show mercy and help those going off course by saying, "On those who waver, have mercy; save others by snatching them out of the fire; on others have mercy with fear, abhorring even the outer garment stained by the flesh. (Letter of Jude 1:22-23).

St. Jude travelled to Judea, Samaria, Idumaa, Syria and Mesopotamia. He is credited with spreading the faith in Libya. He is often pictured wearing green, symbolizing hope and renewal and holding a medallion showing Jesus. There is usually a flame above his head, which represents the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:3).

There are different stories on how St. Jude died, maybe from being beaten, hacked, or beheaded, which is why he is often shown holding a club or axe. Others say that he was shot by arrows while tied to a cross. St. Jude is venerated as the patron saint of hopeless situations, with many miracles credited to his intercession. The devotion to him as patron saint of desperate causes began in France and Germany in the late eighteenth century.

Saints Simon and Jude are models of piety, humility and obedience because they left their former lives to follow Christ. It is believed they were martyred together. Both share the same feast day of October 28. Their relics are held at the Vatican in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome and in the Cathedral of Toulouse in France.

Many of the apostles are famous, but most of the other apostles were really unknown. The interesting observation is that Jesus chose some unlikely people with a former Zealot (Simon), a former (crooked) tax collector (Matthew), an impetuous fisherman (Peter), two "sons of thunder" (James and John) and a man named Judas Iscariot.
