## Pastor's Message / Mensaje del Pastor

Great crowds were traveling with Jesus, and he turned and addressed them, "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. (Lk 14:25)

Throughout the Gospels, we encounter stories of thousands of people who came out to hear Jesus preach, see a miracle, and catch what all the buzz was about. But when he talked about what it meant to follow him, many left. The miracles might have been amazing, the preaching awe-inspiring, but following him - well, Jesus seemed to be asking too much. Today's gospel would definitely be one of those times.



Jesus is using hyperbole to grab our attention because he's about to tell us something central to discipleship:

To follow Jesus means he has to be the most important thing in our lives. Nothing can distract us from our role as followers of Jesus. The rest of our lives flow from that primary relationship we have with him. This isn't easy! We are human beings - we make mistakes, we sin, we make choices that affect our moral freedom.

But the Lord provides for us in our lives, through the Church and the sacraments. Here we are blessed with his word; here we are blessed with his real presence among us; here we receive the grace we need to seek him, to find him, and to follow him. Let us make that choice to follow him and we pray for those whom the Lord continues to call to himself whether in a public way or in the quiet of their hearts.

Who can know God's counsel, or who can conceive what the LORD intends? For the deliberations of mortals are timid, and unsure are our plans. (Wisdom 9:13)

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Grandes multitudes viajaban con Jesús, y él se volvió y se dirigió a ellos: "Si alguien viene a mí sin odiar a su padre, madre, esposa e hijos, hermanos y hermanas, e incluso su propia vida, no puede ser mi discípulo. (Lc 14,25)

A lo largo de los Evangelios, encontramos historias de miles de personas que salieron a escuchar a Jesús predicar, ver un milagro y captar de qué se trataba todo el zumbido. Pero cuando habló de lo que significaba seguirlo, muchos se fueron. Los milagros podrían haber sido asombrosos, la predicación impresionante, pero siguiéndolo, bueno, Jesús parecía estar pidiendo demasiado. El evangelio de hoy definitivamente sería uno de esos momentos.

Jesús está usando la hipérbole para captar nuestra atención porque está a punto de decirnos algo central para el discipulado: Seguir a Jesús significa que él tiene que ser lo más importante en nuestras vidas. Nada puede distraernos de nuestro papel como seguidores de Jesús. El resto de nuestras vidas fluyen de esa relación primaria que tenemos con él. ¡Esto no es fácil! Somos seres humanos: cometemos errores, pecamos, tomamos decisiones que afectan nuestra libertad moral.

Pero el Señor provee para nosotros en nuestras vidas, a través de la Iglesia y los sacramentos. Aquí somos bendecidos con su palabra; aquí somos bendecidos con su presencia real entre nosotros; aquí recibimos la gracia que necesitamos para buscarlo, encontrarlo y seguirlo. Tomemos la decisión de seguirlo y oremos por aquellos a quienes el Señor sigue llamando a sí mismo, ya sea de manera pública o en la tranquilidad de sus corazones.

¿Quién puede conocer el consejo de Dios, o quién puede concebir lo que el Señor quiere? Porque las deliberaciones de los mortales son tímidas, e inseguras son nuestros planes. (Sabiduría 9:13)

#### The Sacrament of Holy Baptism

The sacrament of Holy Baptism is usually scheduled for the third weekend of each month on Sunday at 12:30 PM. Baptismal Preparation Classes are typically scheduled for the third Thursday of each month at 5:30 PM. The preparation class is required for first-time parents or if there is no record of a previous class. A Baptismal date cannot be scheduled before registration for the preparation class is scheduled. Class space is limited; please call Marylu in our office for registration and with questions.

#### The Sacrament

#### of Holy Matrimony

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The sacrament of Holy Matrimony is a serious commitment not to be taken lightly or unadvisedly. typically takes 6-12 months to complete the required and proper preparation for marriage. Therefore, if this sacrament is a consideration, please contact our office approximately one year in advance and before wedding plans and a date are set.

Convalidations: If you are Catholic and married civilly and would like your marriage recognized by the Catholic Church, the process of receiving the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony is approximately a 6 -month process. Please plan ahead and contact our office for more information.

#### El Sacramento del Santo Bautismo

El sacramento del Santo Bautismo generalmente está programado para el tercer fin de semana de cada mes el domingo a las 12:30 PM. Las clases de preparación bautismal generalmente se programan para el tercer jueves de cada mes a las 5:30 PM. La clase de preparación es requerida para padres primerizos o si no hay registro de una clase anterior. No se puede programar una fecha bautismal antes de que se programe la inscripción para la clase de preparación. El espacio de clase es limitado; por favor llame a Marylu en nuestra oficina para registrarse y con preguntas.

#### <u>La Santa Cena del</u> <u>Santo Matrimonio</u>

El sacramento del Santo Matrimonio es un compromiso serio que no debe tomarse a la ligera o desaconsejadamente. Por lo general, toma de 6 a 12 meses completar la preparación requerida y adecuada para el matrimonio. Por lo tanto, si este sacramento es una consideración, comuníquese con nuestra oficina con aproximadamente un año de anticipación y antes de que se establezcan los planes de boda y una fecha.

Convalidaciones: Si usted es católico y está casado civilmente y desea que su matrimonio sea reconocido por la Iglesia Católica, el proceso de recibir el Sacramento del Santo Matrimonio es aproximadamente un proceso de 6 meses. Planifique con anticipación y comuníquese con nuestra oficina para obtener más información.

## This Week's Feature Construction Photo



In case you haven't seen this on our back bulletin board, the above photo is a layout of how the inside of our new church building will look when complete.

As you enter the front door, you will come upon the "secure vestibule" where the receptionist (located immediately on the right) will "buzz" you through (except during Mass times when the door will be open). If you want to enter the office area (located to the right), there is another secure door in which you will have to be buzzed in. Along with the five offices located in this area is a conference room.

If you go straight down the hallway (or Narthex) after being buzzed through the secure vestibule, the gift shop (Sales Kiosk) is on the right. Behind that, is the doorway to the warming kitchen. Further down the Narthex is our Divine Mercy Chapel. The hallway to the right of the chapel takes you to the restrooms (located on the right) as well as to a classroom, the usher's/hospitality room, and an office for the deacon (all located on the left back wall).

Once you are through the secure vestibule, and you wish to enter the worship space, simply go through the doors on your left. To the immediate right and left of that entrance are flex classrooms that can be retracted in order to give us more seating for the weekend Masses.

Under the beautiful three-panel window will be the Altar. To the left of the Altar, is a place for storage and to the right is the Sacristy.



## St. Teresa of Calcutta

Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhi was born on August 26, 1910 in Skopje, Macedonia, the youngest child of Nikola and Drane Bojaxhiu. She received her First Communion at the age of five and was confirmed in November 1916, at the age of six. Her father died when she was eight years old leaving her family in financial trouble. Her religious education took place at the Jesuit parish of the Sacred Heart. As a young girl, she was very involved with her church and wanted to be a missionary.

At the age of eighteen, Agnes left her home in September 1928 to join the Sisters of Loreto in Ireland. She received the name Sister Mary Teresa after St. Therese of Lisieux, the Little Flower. She left for India in December 1929, arriving in Calcutta. There she made her First Profession of Vows in May 1931, She was assigned to the Loreto Entally community in Calcutta and taught at St. Mary's School for girls. Sister Teresa made her Final Profession of Vows on May 24, 1937. From then on she was called Mother Teresa. She continued teaching at St. Mary's, becoming principal in 1944. Her twenty years in Loreto were filled with happiness. She was well known for her charity, unselfishness,



courage, hard work and a natural talent for organization. She lived with fidelity and joy, but she wanted more.

On September 10, 1946, during a train ride from Calcutta to Darjeeling, Mother Teresa was on her annual retreat. That day she received her "inspiration, her call within a call." She felt Christ's desire for love and for souls taking hold of her heart. The need to satisfy Christ's need became the driving force of her life. Jesus appeared to her and told her of His desire of His heart for "victims of love" who would "radiate His love on souls." "Come be my light' He begged her. "I cannot go alone." Jesus revealed His pain at the neglect of the poor, His sorrow that they did not know Him and His longing for their love. He asked Mother Teresa to establish a religious community, the Missionaries of Charity, who would be dedicated to the service of the poorest of the poor.

It took nearly two years before Mother Teresa received permission to begin. On August 17, 1948, she dressed for the first time in a white, blue-bordered sari and left her Loreto convent to enter the world of the poor. She took a short course with the Medical Mission Sisters in Patna, then Mother Teresa returned to Calcutta and found a temporary home with the Little Sisters of the Poor. Mother Teresa went to the slums for the first time on December 21, visiting families, washing children's sores, then cared for an old man lying on the road and nursed a woman dying of hunger and TB.

Each day started with Communion and then she went out, always with a rosary in her hand, to find "the unwanted, the unloved, the uncared for." After some months, many of her former students joined her. The new congregation of the Missionaries of Charity was officially established in the Archdiocese of Calcutta on October 7, 1950. By the early 1960s, Mother Teresa started sending her Sisters to other parts of India.

Pope Paul VI granted The Decree of Praise to the Congregation in February 1965, encouraging Mother Teresa to open a house in Venezuela. This was soon followed by foundations in Rome, Tanzania and eventually on every continent. Starting in 1980 and continuing through the 1990s, Mother Teresa opened houses in many communist countries, including the former Soviet Union, Albania and Cuba. She founded the Missionaries of Charity Brothers in 1963, the Contemplative Sisters in 1976, the Contemplative Brothers in 1979 and the Missionaries of Charity Fathers in 1984. She formed the Co-workers of Mother Teresa and the Sick and Suffering Co-Workers with people of many faiths and nationalities with whom she shared her spirit of prayer, simplicity, sacrifice and her apostolate of humble works of love. This later inspired the Lay Missionaries of Charity. In 1981 Mother Teresa also began the Corpus Christi Movement for Priests as a "little way of holiness" for those who wanted to share in her charisma and spirit.

The world recognized her with numerous awards, beginning with the Indian Padmashri Award in 1962 and then the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979. She received both prizes and attention 'for the glory of God and in the name of the poor." She was deeply religious, but was often affected by the poverty that surrounded her. Her health declined, but she kept working. By 1997, her Sisters numbered nearly 4,000 and were established in six hundred ten foundations in one hundred twenty three countries. In March 1997 she turned over her work to her newly-elected successor, made one more trip abroad, met with Pope John Paul II and then returned to Calcutta, spending her final weeks receiving visitors and instructing her Sisters. She died on September 5, 1997. The process for her sainthood began within two years of her death. Pope John Paul II issued a special dispensation to expedite the process of canonization, beatifying her on October 19, 2003. Pope Francis canonized her on September 4, 2016.

St. Teresa of Calcutta's feast day is September 5 and she is the patron saint of World Youth Day and the Diocese of Calcutta.

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
